

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Fowlerville Girls Basketball Team ties for 2nd in league, reaches district finals

Fowlerville High School's Varsity Basketball Team tied for second in the CAAC White Division and then won a semifinal round in the Class B Districts to put them in the finals. Both accomplishments came thanks to a pair of wins over Lansing Catholic.

The Gladiators traveled to the Cougars' home court for the final game of the regular season on Friday, Feb. 24, and came home with a 51-33 win. That left them tied for second place in the CAAC White Division. Williamston captured the top

Then this past Wednesday the local cagers won a semifinal round against Lansing Catholic in the Class B Districts, hosted at Fowlerville High, by a 49-30 score. With that victory, Fowlerville was set to play in the championship game this past Friday against Williamston (past the newspaper deadline.)

In the season finale, Fowlerville took a slight 12-10 lead over the Cougars in the first quarter and widened the margin to 27-17 by halftime. They outscored Lansing Catholic 10-5 in the third stanza and 14-11 in the final period of play. A key difference was Fowlerville making 17 two-point baskets to Lansing Catholic's 9 buckets.

Leading the Glads were Jackie Jarvis with 15 points, 6 rebounds, 5 steals, 2 assists and Elie Smith with 15 points, 10 rebounds, 5 blocks. Ollie Updike also scored in double figures with 10 points and had 3 steals. Other contributors were Meghan Douglass with 7 points, 5 rebounds, 4 assists, 3 steals and Averie Latson and Sarah Matlock with 2 points each.

Lansing Catholic was led by Maggie Jacobs with 9 points and Stefi Kracko with 7 points.

In the district semi-final game, Fowlerville jumped to a 13-4 lead in the opening quarter and were up 33-9 by intermission. Fowlerville outscored the Cougars 10-6 in the third stanza to hold a 43-15 lead going into the final period of play.

Elie Smith had 15 points, 10 rebounds, 6 blocks, 2 assists, 2 steals; Ollie Updike contributed 11 points, 2 rebounds, 2

assists; Jackie Jarvis helped with 10 points,4 rebounds, 4 assists, 4 steals; while Meghan Douglass had 5 points, 5 rebounds, 4 assists, 1 steal; Sarah Matlock finished with 4 points, 1 rebound, 3 steals;

Mersades McDowell had 2 points, 1 rebound; and Grace Wallace scored 2 points and grabbed 2 rebounds.

Lansing Catholic was led by Katy Shannon with 9 points.

Fowlerville Boys Varsity Basketball Team lost two games last week. This past Tuesday they were defeated by Hartland in a non-league home game, 52-45, while on Friday, Feb. 24, the Glads lost a conference contest at Lansing Catholic, 83-

Against Hartland, the Glads trailed their opponents 10-9 after the opening stanza but roared back with 20 points in the second quarter to take a 29-16 lead into the halftime.

The Eagles outscored Fowlerville 11-8 in the third stanza, leaving the Glads with a 37-27 advantage to start the fourth period. Led by Brandon Harrison, who scored all 13 of his points in the fourth quarter, Hartland came from behind to win the game. The Eagles scored 25 points in that final period while Fowlerville managed only eight.

For Fowlerville, Dan Judd led the way with 15 points and 5 rebounds. Geoffrey Knaggs added 12 points and 6 rebounds. Cam Brigham tallied 7 points, and Caden Collins had 6. Andrew Spalding played a nice game, scoring 5 points, grabbing 3 rebounds, and swiping 3 steals.

"It was a tough way for the seniors to end their careers on their home court but they can be proud of the effort they have put in tonight and all season long," said Coach Fred Hackett.

Against Lansing Catholic, the local cagers fell behind 19-7 in the opening stanza and were down 40-24 at intermission. The Cougars widened their lead with 25 points to the Glads' 18 in the third stanza.

Dan Judd led all scorers with 27 points for the Gladiators. Knaggs had 8 and Brady Salter scored 7.

The Gladiators who are 7-12 overall and finished at 4-6 in the CAAC White Division, ended their regular season this past Thursday with a game at Perry.

They play the winner of the Lansing Catholic-Lansing Sexton game in district action this Wednesday at Williamston.

Lent 2017: Time for New Beginnings

One of my favorite authors was Henri Nouwen. This man wrote several books during his lifetime, many of which I have read and still browse through occasionally today.

In his book, "The Here and Now," Nouwen says, "We must learn to live each day, each hour, and even each minute as a new beginning."

While serving as a United Methodist pastor for eighteen years, I understand very well the meaning of new beginnings. Gloria and I have moved more times than I care to think about. With each new church and each new city, we are always faced with new challenges and new obstacles to overcome.

The fact that we are no longer pastoring for a church and being moved from city to city doesn't mean that the challenges and obstacles have disappeared; as long as we live and commit to following Christ we will have challenges that threaten our goal to please God.

I chose this week to return to my writings because it is the first week of the Lenten season, and it is a good time to take some time to focus our attention back to what it means to be a disciple of Christ. This is a time when Christians fast and pray in preparation for the coming day of the Resurrection, otherwise known as Easter. It is a good time for self-examination, as well as a time to take a look at our relationships and our spiritual lives. It is a time for us to consider just how seriously we take our commitment to follow Christ. Lent is a time for us to become more centered on pleasing Christ and to cast aside the worldly, temporary distractions that pop up in our lives on a regular basis.

When our primary goal in life is to please the God of all creation, then everyone around us benefits--our relationship with our spouses and children, our friends, our co-workers and even the people we meet in passing. Removing the obstacles that the enemy places before us to sidetrack and derail us will help us to focus more on the mission that God has given us, which is the reconciling of his people back to

In 2 Corinthians 5:17-21 it says:

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of

reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

In case you haven't noticed lately our nation and the world around us is in need of reconciliation. We have made God invisible and have sought to replace him with gods of our own choosing. The word "Christian" has come to mean everything from "I go to church" to "I do a lot of good things." Our country needs a revival, and it must begin with prayer, fasting and sacrifice.

The bible tells us what God expects of all who follow Christ. It can be found in Matthew 22:37-38 and Matthew 28:19-20

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself."

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

These two short passages of scripture sum up the entire bible and point us to the road that leads to eternal life with

IS YOUR CHILD

"Do one thing every day that scares you" - Eleanor Roosevelt

You may think this is an odd question but: Is your child failing, struggling and experiencing hardship often enough?

You can have too much failure in a child's life and this is not good. We see this sometimes for a few kids here who fail and struggle at everything. But what I want to write about is actually much more common. Often children do not experience enough failure especially at younger ages.

A child is like a tree. The tree needs both sunshine (successes/ positives) and rain (failure/negatives) to thrive. The right proportions of both and the tree will be tall, strong and flourish. But what happens when it gets too much sunshine and little water? What happens when it gets tons of rain and no sunshine? An over protected tree is weak. The slightest wind (or fears) blows it down. The smallest pests (or bullies) destroy it. So your child is really the same.

Why is failure good? It is the only way your child can develop the skills, attitudes and character traits vital for success and happiness in life. Courage, persistence, perseverance, tenacity, work ethic are only born through hardship and stress. None of these can be learned by watching or reading or talking about it. They definitely cannot be learned with things which come too easy or too fast. These skills develop through the deep emotional experience of failure.

The best thing you can do as a parent is give them smaller doses of failure more often. (We will be happy to take care of the big ones for you!) Things like boredom. Let them get bored because it is good for their development. Let them skin their knee. Don't pick them up all the time. Let them solve their own problems. Except for bullying, let them fight their own fights. Make them do chores and things they do not like often. Make them eat things they do not like often. Insist they do lots of small things they do not like. Make them stop an activity like video gaming when they do not want to. Make them wait. Teach them to do things well whether they like it or not. I learned a new quote which I love - "You don't have to like what you are doing to love what you are doing!"

So if your child were a tree, how often do you pull out that "parenting umbrella" to protect them from both the sun and rain? Do you have that umbrella open too much or all the time? You might actually be doing more to hurt them than protect them. And if you have that umbrella out too much it just might bring up that "H" word . . . Helicopter Parents!

Put that umbrella away except in emergencies. They need it a lot less than you think.

Detroit TV newscaster Ron Savage, who died on Feb. 25, was a 1972 Fowlerville High School graduate

Ron Savage, FOX 2 anchor and reporter, and resident of Milford, died on Saturday morning, February 25, 2017, following a cardiac arrest during a training exercise with the Milford Fire Department where he volunteered. Ron was 63 years old.

Ron grew up on his family farm south of Fowlerville and attended Fowlerville Community Schools, graduating from high school in 1972. His classmates and many area friends remember him for his great sense of humor, upbeat attitude, and unique personality.



Determination Through Difficulties

For Labor Day last year, I traveled up to the UP to participate in the Mackinac Bridge Walk. It was fantastic. If you have never had the opportunity to do so, then I highly encourage you to try your best to make the trip up north to join in with the thousands of other people crossing the bridge. It's a pretty amazing and unique experience. As someone who takes great pride in being a Michigander, it gave me a special feeling to be surrounded by so many other lovers of the Great Lakes State and to perform the iconic trek across such a great landmark. Despite being a relatively short distance, it gave me a certain feeling of accomplishment to have crossed the Mighty Mac.

But this article isn't about my trip over the bridge, per se. Rather, I wanted to share with you something that I saw while there that really impacted me. I had passed the halfway point when I noticed a little girl, probably around 7 years old, walking with a man who I can only assume was her grandfather. That wasn't really unusual. There were plenty of children accompanying their parents or grandparents. However, what made the situation significant was that she was blind. She clung tightly onto the man's hand as he led her carefully through the bustling crowd. I only saw them for a few seconds, but it was enough to really get me thinking.

One of the things that I enjoy most about the walk across the Mackinac Bridge is getting to see the beautiful scenery. The Great Lakes are an awesome sight in all of their early Fall majesty. I love watching the boats make their way through the water, and it's breathtaking to see through the grates beneath me the waves crashing against the bridge's pillars. All of this I could soak in and enjoy. However, that little girl could see none of it. Her experience of the bridge

walk was vastly different than mine. She did not have the benefit of viewing all of Michigan's magnificence like I did.

You know what else I noticed about her, though? She was smiling. She was happy. She was content. She wasn't about to let her limitations spoil her good time. I obviously have not experienced it firsthand, but I have to think that I would be rather frightened if I was in her position. She was completely surrounded by thousands of bustling people with only her grandpa to guide her. It no doubt took great courage for her to make such an expedition.

What an example for all of us! I don't know about you, but when I saw her, all of my problems seemed to pale in comparison. Regardless, she demonstrated determination through her difficulties. Can we say that? Do we give up at the first sign of resistance or trouble? Do we abandon our principles because we fear backlash? Because she certainly

did not allow her circumstances dictate her decisions. She was an impressive little girl.



Fowlerville Rotary Club hosted its annual Farmers Day Program last Wednesday at the First United Methodist Church. Over 100 farmers, other guests, and Rotarians attended the

Highlights of the program included a brief overview by School Superintendent Wayne Roedel of the new vocational agriculture program that was started this year at the Fowlerville High School and includes a FFA Chapter. The teacher-advisor is Curtis Refior, a Webberville High graduate. Refior was introduced and also offered a few comments about the program. He, in turn, introduced some of the students who accompanied him to the lunch.

Members of the Ag Issues Team from the Webberville FFA were also present and gave a presentation. The team is competing in the state contest. State Senator Joe Hune of Fowlerville was another of those in attendance. He chairs the Senate Agriculture Committee.

The guest speaker was Carl Bednarski, a Tuscola County cash crop farmer who was elected the 16th president of Michigan Farm Bureau on Dec. 4, 2014 at the group's 95th annual meeting.

It was noted that he farms with his wife Lisa and their three sons, growing corn, dry beans, sugar beets, soybeans and

Bednarski talked on a number of issues, including the current economic struggles many farmers face with low commodity prices and the public's changing perceptions on food safety and quality.

He noted that the lack of high-speed internet is an obstacle for rural development, explaining that many people would like to live in the country and work from their homes. He cited this as a problem for food processors who would like to have a plant in a rural area, close to its customers, rather than transporting it to an out-of-state location and trucking it back to Michigan.

Bednarski also talked in general about rules and regulations placed on farmers, expressing his feeling that many of them were unnecessary or burdensome.




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

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

2016 Water Quality Report for the Village of Webberville

This report covers the drinking water quality for the Village of Webberville, for the calendar year 2016. This information is a snapshot of the quality of the water that we provided to you in 2016. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state standards.

Your water comes from the Basal Member of the Saginaw Formation via three groundwater wells at a depth of 220 and 210 feet located at 425 S. Maple St. and 180 Pine St. The state performed an assessment of our source water in 2003 to determine the susceptibility or the relative potential of contamination. The susceptibility rating is on a seven-tiered scale from "very-low" to "very-high" based on geologic sensitivity, well construction, water chemistry, and contamination sources. The susceptibility of our source is moderately-high.

There are no significant sources of contamination in our water supply. We are making efforts to protect our sources by participating in a wellhead protection program and conducting regular source water monitoring. - Contaminants and their presence in water: Drinking Water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- Vulnerability of sub-populations: Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- Sources of drinking water: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. Our water comes from wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.
- Contaminants that may be present in source water include:
- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.
- Radioactive contaminants, which are naturally occurring or can be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which provide the same protection for public health.

Water Quality Data

The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the 2016 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 – December 31, 2016. The State allows us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. All of the data is representative of the water quality, but some are more than one year old.

- <u>Action Level:</u> The concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers treatment, or other requirements that a water system must follow.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MDRL): Means the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

** While your drinking water meets the standard for arsenic it does contain low levels of arsenic. EPA's standard balances the current understanding of arsenic's possible health effects against the costs of removing the arsenic from the drinking water. EPA continues to research the health effects of low levels of arsenic, which is a mineral known to cause cancer in humans at high concentrations and is linked to other health effects such as skin damage and circulatory problems.

***Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. Monitoring helps EPA to determine where certain contaminants occur and whether it needs to regulate those contaminants.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village of Webberville is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. Is our water system meeting other rules that govern our operations? The State and EPA require us to test our water on a regular basis to ensure its safety. During the monitoring period from August 1, 2016 to August 31, 2016, we did not take the required number of samples for total trihalomethanes and haloacetic acids (five). Please see the following page for further information.

We are committed to providing you safe, reliable, and healthy water. We are pleased to provide you with this information to keep you fully informed about your water. We will be updating this report annually, and will also keep you informed of any problems that may occur throughout the year, as they happen.

We invite public participation in decisions that affect drinking water quality. Our village council meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 P.M. at the village hall at 115 S. Main Street. The public is invited.

Michigan House Report

Legislation I introduced this past week will encourage the safe delivery of newborns by parents who would like to remain anonymous and surrender their child under existing state law. This would change some reporting requirements used by hospitals and other institutions so that a parent's name will no longer be associated with a baby when delivered or dropped off at a hospital under the Safe Delivery of Newborns Law. I want to ensure that babies will be delivered as safely as possible and guaranteeing a parent's anonymity helps accomplish that goal. This legislation helps to encourage birth over abortion or child abandonment. The Michigan Right to Life supports this measure and I am proud to sponsor it.

Vignettes are small icons that first appeared on ballots in the 1890's to help individuals identify the political party they wish to vote for. Party vignettes, however, have the potential to confuse voters who might believe that circling the icon is all that needs to be done to cast a straight-party ballot. For this reason, I introduced a bill to remove the icons from the ballot and ensure that votes are always cast correctly. I delivered testimony to the House Elections and Ethics Committee on this legislation on Thursday. Thank you to Livingston County Clerk Elizabeth Hundley who joined me for testimony. The bill now waits to be considered by the committee.

I enjoyed the opportunity to serve as a panelist during the Michigan Pharmacists Association annual meeting at the Renaissance Center. It was an honor to participate with Senate Majority Leader Arlan Meekhof, House Minority Leader Sam Singh, and my colleague state Rep. Klint Kesto of Commerce Township. It was a very spirited and candid conversation and I am thankful I was able to contribute.

This week we kick off March is Reading Month! In addition to improving vocabulary, reading also enhances memory and reduces stress levels. Research shows that there is a direct correlation between a student's reading ability and their success in school. Reading is essential to everyday life, both inside and outside the classroom, that's why each year the House observes March as "Reading Month" in the state of Michigan. I will visit several schools throughout our community this month to read aloud to students. 
