They varied in origin and content, but the vast majority came from elementary and middle school children. Some of the kids talked about their hobbies and their favorite subjects in school. Others were very curious about the experiences of the receivers of the letters, asking about what jobs the troops had or what things were like where they were deployed. However, despite the differences in information and questions between each letter, the consistent theme was that of thankfulness. They recognized and appreciated the sacrifices made by the U.S. forces to give them the freedom to do as they pleased.

I have to ask, how is it that these kids grasped a concept that we, as adults, seem to struggle with so much? I'm not talking about showing respect and gratitude to the troops, although that is important, too. No, I am talking about being willing to show appreciation to those around us in general. I don't know about you, but I like it when someone recognizes me in a positive way for something that I've done. It's not being egotistical. As humans, we want to feel like we're having a constructive impact on others, and it's hard to know if we're making a difference if no one ever tells us.

When was the last time you told someone "thanks for being you" for no particular reason? Did you thank the person bagging your food the last time that you were in the grocery store? How often do you leave a few extra bucks for the waiter or waitress that did a particularly good job? If we want some recognition, then I can guarantee that other people want to feel appreciated as well. It doesn't require a lot of effort on our part, and it makes a huge difference for the person receiving the praise. Just hearing "thanks" can mean the world to someone who is having a rough day.

In my humble opinion, it's actually a really cool concept. Just by showing some basic respect, you can drastically improve someone's day. How awesome is that? That's a lot of power that you're wielding there. I can tell you something else from experience: when you go out of your way to make someone else feel better, you end up feeling pretty good yourself. "Altogether, we have a cast of about 40 students and another 20 kids who are working behind-the-scenes, doing such things as lighting, moving the stage scenery, and handling the sound effects and music," said David.

In addition, a number of parents have pitched in to build props for the different scenes, make costumes, and take care of

make-up. "I couldn't do this without their help," noted David.

The drama club, which David sponsors as an after-school activity, doesn't have 60 members. To get the added help, David said recruited seventh graders he currently has for his different classes, eighth graders he had in class last year, and even dressed as a pirate when he went into a sixth-grade classroom to find performers.

Most of Bill David's school day is spent teaching the required science course for seventh grade along with other science electives that are offered. Two years ago, though, he volunteered to handle the theater class that is offered and to be the sponsor for the drama club.

"The administration needed someone to fill the vacancy," he said. "I'd had experience acting in high school and in Community Theater, so I said I'd take the class."

As an instructor, David is energetic and innovative. In earlier years, he started the Jr. High Science Club and the Science Olympiad Program. For five years he sponsored the Chess Club.

He's brought the same approach to this new endeavor,

starting off by deciding to save the Drama Club money by writing the play rather than paying royalties for one.

"Most of the free plays that are available aren't that good or aren't a good fit for junior high students," he said. "The good plays have royalties that are expensive for us. We only have a budget of around \$1,500, and the plays cost from \$300 to \$400 to use. I'd rather use the money for scenery and costumes."

David started out by writing and directing 'Halloween Hullabaloo' which, he noted,

contain six short acts. "We did that last year and this fall," he

'Pirates Palooza' is, he pointed out, a more traditional play. "With three acts and intermission, it should run about two hours.'

David held tryouts in December and, since early January, has been overseeing the rehearsals. "We've been meeting at the auditorium five days a week after school," he said. "The kids have been working very hard."

While putting on the play and entertaining the audience is the ultimate goal, David said that the participating students are learning different skills. "A number of them are learning how to act, memorizing their lines and moving properly around the stage. Others are learning how to apply stage make-up, to create appropriate costumes, and to handle sound effects and lighting.'

They are also having fun. Or at least David is. "It's been a great joy to do this," he said.

The experience has also ignited a new ambition for the longtime educator. "I'd been planning to retire in two more years," he noted. "I'd like to direct and write plays for Community Theater. A resident of Grand Blanc, he added that his dream is to work with the nearby Flint Youth Theatre. "They're world famous and it would be wonderful to be involved in this organization," he said.

# TV Drug Advertising By Thomas Higby, M.D.

In considering changes in the medical world during my life-time hardly anything compares to the advertising of prescription pharmaceutical products on television, something that would have been considered improper or unethical in the past. One can hardly tune in to any program (I haven't yet tried cartoons.) without being bombarded by attractive actors of both sexes, showing by their evident wonderful state of health, that they have benefitted greatly from their use of the drug being promoted. There are several points of view on this matter and its associated problems.

Let's look at the type of drugs advertised. They are mostly drugs that should not be prescribed lightly. Generally, they

are potent, dangerous if miss-used, and should only be prescribed by experienced physicians familiar with those side effects that are recited at frightening length. A prudent consumer, listening to those terrible possible complications, would be reluctant to try the products; one might feel, in fact, a great desire to run far away. It's a paradox to me that they can calculate financial gain out of scaring potential users.

The diseases for which the TV ads are promoting treatments are often serious, life threatening, and not diagnosed without careful consideration. The final request: "Ask your doctor about -----!" puts an enormous burden on the doctor, who now has to take time away from more important matters to explain why the drug in question might not be appropriate for the situation. The patient may now feel resentful toward the doctor over being denied the drug that he or she has already

decided, based on the advertisement, is just the thing for the ailment that he or she may have self-diagnosed. Even we doctors must avoid self-diagnosing ourselves, lest we have the proverbial fool for a patient.

The drug company has just put immense cost into the production of an advertisement that might scare any sensible person. Where does that money come from? Clearly from your pocket! The cost must be added onto the price of the drug. Those immense costs could be diverted toward lowering the costs of the drugs. Drug costs are a major driver of the U.S. bill for health care, and a constant subject of political controversy. One reads of certain drugs costing over \$100,000 per year, bankrupting some patients.

The drug companies talk much about costs of research and development of new and important products, which can be extreme. Some of those expenses could be recovered by eliminating the TV ads.

In fairness to the drug companies, I must tell of a young uninsured woman whom I saw with fever, chest pain, high WBC, and weakness, and on whom I heard a prominent and strange heart murmur; an echocardiogram showed evidence of bacterial endocarditis, a life-threatening heart infection. I felt that she needed hospital treatment, but she was resistant to the idea. I then had a phone consultation with the chief of infectious disease at UMH. He thought we could try outpatient treatment using an expensive injectable antibiotic (cephtriaxone or Rocephin) on a daily schedule. I spoke to the drug rep about the recommended antibiotic. Only one question was asked: "How much do you need?" It was supplied at no cost. The treatment was successful and the woman very happy with the outcome. This was not a unique experience for me; I've always in the past had great respect for those companies, probably resulting from growing up hanging around my father's drug store. I knew that my dad had high regard for the "detail men". Yes they were men and always experienced pharmacists. It saddens me that the old respectable drug companies have, from my point of view, lowered themselves by the TV advertising.




### Webberville Food Bank Thanks Community

### Ask the Michigan State Trooper

Sports teams do it all the time. They have what is known as the throwback jersey. This jersey is a one-time retro look to honor the teams of the past, or remember a special occasion. Now, Troopers, well we pretty much have the Detroit Tigers of uniforms. (I know you thought I would say the Yankees but we're in Tiger country and I only cheer for the Tigers.) Michigan State Police uniforms do change a little from time to time, but just like the Tigers old English "D", it is immediately recognizable.

Some changes have been made for safety, some for comfort, and we even have a new hat. The patches and badges have even changed a little through the years, taking on a slightly different form or design. However, the one thing that remains consistent is the person inside the uniform. The person inside is still made of the same integrity, honor, and excellence that has made our department a leader in law enforcement.

These changes have always been minor and maybe, unless you were in the department, you wouldn't have even noticed them. There has been another change however that sticks out a little more, have you seen it? It's out there, driving around right now....wearing a throw back jersey.

This week a person asked the Brighton Post "Is there a new Michigan State Police vehicle or am I seeing things." No, you are not seeing things. We still have the same vehicle, however, it is wearing a throwback jersey....so to speak.

On January 11th of this year, 50 special edition black and gold patrol cars joined our fleet in honor of the Michigan State Police 100th Anniversary. These vehicles are fully equipped 2016 Dodge Chargers and are painted to resemble the departments 1937 Ford Model 74 patrol car. The 1937 Ford Model 74 patrol vehicle was one of the department's first patrol cars and is the oldest vehicle in the department's historical fleet.

The Michigan State Police actually used black and gold patrol vehicles until 1954 when Commissioner Joseph A. Childs changed the department patrol cars to the bright shade of blue that we use today. Hello everyone. I hope this letter finds you well.

With the completion of first semester in the books, we are now setting our sights on preparations for the remainder of the school year. As we evaluate our programs and activities each year, FHS strives to better each aspect of our school for students.
