#### Fowlerville District Library making preparations to move to new home

The Fowlerville District Library is making preparations to move to our new home at 130 S. Grand Avenue.

We are planning to be closed for the move beginning Monday, May 7th. We will be having an all-staff meeting Friday, May 3<sup>rd</sup> from 9:30 am-12pm to discuss the moving plan. To prepare for the move, the non-fiction area will be closed beginning Monday, April 30. While it is closed, staff members will be happy to retrieve non-fiction books for you.

Friday, June 15, is our projected opening day at our new library: 130 Grand Ave; however, if we can open earlier than that date, we will. During our closure, we will be working hard to make our new library ready for your use.

Please keep an eye on our Upcoming Programs in the Fowlerville News and Views, our Facebook page, and our website www.fowlervillelibrary.org.

In preparation of moving to our new home, beginning Saturday, April 21, we are increasing the number of items a patron can check out. Each patron will be allowed to check out up to 50 items; 12 of each may be DVDs. Each household will be allowed to check out a total of 24 DVDs. We are also extending the due dates of these items until June 15. We are requesting that patrons keep items checked out during this time until June 15. Patrons will be responsible for any materials damaged if left outside of either building.

To give you an idea of how large this move is, we are:

- Adding 27 donated bookcases to our library... that is 240 shelves! The staff will be responsible for assembling those 27 donated bookcases.
- Moving 101 bookcases from our current location and 5 bookcases that are in storage due to lack of space.
- Moving 39,092 items in our collection and reuniting the 40 boxes of books that have been in storage due to lack
- Moving and putting together all 10 computers in our computer lab
- Bring our historical collection back from the Village Offices to our beautiful new Historical Room and reorganizing this special collection
- Organizing all our programming supplies, including all the supplies that are in storage, and reorganizing our complete amount of supplies in our dedicated programming room storage area

This list is just a sample of what is involved in our "BIG MOVE" to the new library!

Due to the size of our move, MelCat requests will be suspended beginning Monday, April 23. We apologize for this inconvenience and thank you for your understanding while we work to bring you a new library and services.

Services that we are expanding in preparation to meet your reading needs during this time include eBooks and eAudio titles in the Axis360 app, and we will be updating titles on all the eReaders. We have eBooks available for all ages! eReaders are available as a Junior Fiction collection, a Teen Fiction Collection, and an Adult Collection.

We are not able to accept book donations. When we are able to accept book donations, we will make an announcement. If you have gently used books you'd like to donate, please share them with H.T. Smith Elementary school for their annual book sale. As we have more information to share about our "Big Move" we will keep you posted through the Fowlerville News and Views, our Facebook page, and our website www.fowlervillelibrary.org.

Please do not park in the drop-off (Kiss & Go) lane in front of the school. This lane is to be used for parents to drop off their children and move ahead so the next car can do a drop-off. During the school day, this is the fire lane- DO NOT PARK THERE!

**Medication** –Just a reminder that ALL medications must be delivered to the office by an adult/parent/guardian. The prescription medications must have a current prescription sticker with instructions for dispensing the medication, doctor's name, and child's name. \*Parents will have to complete a form in the office for both prescription and non-prescription medications.

## Court of Appeals ruling says prisoners also covered by state's Civil Rights Act

On March 27, the Michigan Court of Appeals ruled that an amendment to a state law passed in 1999 determining that prisoners were not covered by the Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act (ELCRA) was unconstitutional. The court's majority opinion further found that the state is not immune from liability in lawsuits filed by prisoners alleging violations of their civil rights.

"We applaud not just the result, but also the straightforward reasoning of the Court. The court found that because the Michigan Constitution proclaims 'No person shall be denied the equal protection of the laws,' it is unconstitutional to deny that protection to persons in prison. The court's point cannot be overstated, and it is at the heart of all we do; equal protection isn't equal unless it applies to everyone," stated

Agustin Arbulu, Michigan Department of Civil Rights Executive Director.



#### **Resurrection Sunday**

Praise the Lord, my soul. I will praise the Lord all my LIFE; I WILL SING PRAISE TO MY GOD AS LONG AS I LIVE. Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save. When their spirit departs, they return to the ground; on that very day their plans come to nothing .Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the LORD THEIR GOD. HE IS THE MAKER OF HEAVEN AND EARTH, THE SEA, AND EVERYTHING IN THEM—HE REMAINS FAITHFUL FOREVER. HE UPHOLDS THE CAUSE OF THE OPPRESSED AND GIVES FOOD TO THE HUNGRY. THE Lord sets prisoners free, the Lord gives sight to the blind, THE LORD LIFTS UP THOSE WHO ARE BOWED DOWN, THE LORD LOVES THE RIGHTEOUS THE LORD WATCHES OVER THE FOREIGNER AND SUS-TAINS THE FATHERLESS AND THE WIDOW, BUT HE FRUSTRATES THE WAYS OF THE WICKED. THE LORD REIGNS FOREVER, YOUR GOD, O ZION, FOR ALL GENERATIONS. PRAISE THE LORD (PSALM 146).

There is a lot of confusion regarding what Easter Sunday is all about. For some, Easter Sunday is about the Easter Bunny, colorfully decorated Easter eggs, and Easter egg hunts. Most people understand that Easter Sunday has something to do with the resurrection of Jesus, but are confused as to how the resurrection is related to the Easter eggs and the Easter bunny.

Biblically speaking, there is absolutely no connection between the resurrection of Jesus Christ and the common modern traditions related to Easter Sunday.

Essentially, what occurred is that in order to make Christianity more attractive to non-Christians, the ancient Roman Catholic Church mixed the celebration of Jesus' resurrection with celebrations that involved spring fertility rituals. These spring fertility rituals are the source of the egg and bunny traditions.

The Bible makes it clear that Jesus was resurrected on the first day of the week, Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:2, 9; Luke 24:1; John 20:1,19). It says in 1 Corinthians 15:1-4: Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain. For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve.

While it is appropriate for Jesus's resurrection to be celebrated on a Sunday, the day on which Jesus's resurrection is celebrated should not be referred to as Easter. Easter has nothing to do with Jesus's resurrection on a Sunday.

As a result, many Christians feel strongly that the day on which we celebrate Jesus's resurrection should not be referred to as "Easter Sunday." Rather, something like "Resurrection Sunday" would be far more appropriate and biblical. For the Christian, it is unthinkable that we would allow the silliness of Easter eggs and the Easter bunny to be the focus of the day instead of Jesus's resurrection.

By all means, celebrate Christ's resurrection on Easter Sunday. Christ's resurrection is something that should be celebrated every day, not just once a year. At the same time, if we choose to celebrate Easter Sunday, we should not allow the fun and games to distract our attention from what the day should truly be all about—the fact that Jesus was resurrected from the dead, and that his resurrection demonstrates that we can indeed be promised an eternal home in Heaven by receiving Jesus as our Savior. (Excerpts for the above were taken from an Article on "What is Easter Sunday?

This is the day the Lord has made, I will rejoice and be glad in it (Psalm 118:24). Resurrection Sunday is truly a day for rejoicing and lifting up praises to God. If you read the last five books of Psalms beginning with chapter 146, you will see that the Psalmist's focus is on praising God. He ends this great book in chapter 150 with these words. "Let everything that has breath, praise the Lord" (150:6).

Resurrection Sunday, is the day Jesus stepped out of the tomb and claimed the victory over sin and death forever. He took all of our sins on himself and suffered the punishment

Do you know what that means? It means we have much for which to be thankful. It means Jesus has paid our debt, and we ought to be grateful beyond measure. It means if we accept the gift of salvation that God offers to those who believe in his Son, we can spend our eternity in the presence of Jesus, basking in a sinless world of perfection.

The Bible gives us the path that leads to eternal life. First, we must recognize that we have sinned against God: "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). All of us have done things that are displeasing to God which makes us deserving of punishment. Since all our sins are ultimately against an eternal God, only an eternal punishment is sufficient. "The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans

However, Jesus Christ, the sinless (1 Peter 2:22), eternal Son of God became a man (John 1:1,14) and died to pay our penalty. "God demonstrates His love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). Jesus Christ died on the cross (John 19:31-42), taking the punishment that we deserve (2 Corinthians 5:21). Three days later he rose from the dead (1 Corinthians 15:1-4), proving his victory over sin and death. "In His great mercy He has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus

Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3).

That is what we celebrate today; not Easter, but the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Nothing should ever overshadow Christ. For he is our salvation.

#### Michigan's 2018 fishing license season kicks off today, April 1

For those interested in going fishing in Michigan, a new license is required starting today, Sunday, April 1. This is the kickoff to the state's 2018 fishing license season, as well as the new fishing regulation cycle. All 2018 fishing licenses are good through March 31, 2019.

Anglers have eight options to choose from when making their purchase. All fishing licenses are good for all species.

- --Resident annual \$26
- --Nonresident annual \$76
- --Senior annual (for residents age 65 or older) \$11
- --24-hour (resident or nonresident) \$10
- --72-hour (resident or nonresident) \$30
- --Resident combo hunt/fish (base, annual fishing, two deer) - \$76
- --Senior resident combo hunt/fish (base, annual fishing, two deer) - \$43
- --Nonresident combo hunt/fish (base, annual fishing, two deer) - \$266

There are several regulation changes this year, creating many new fishing opportunities for anglers. The new regulations go into effect on April 1, 2018, including the following:

--Muskellunge harvest season has changed statewide to the first Saturday in June and includes a new catch-andimmediate release season open all year.

-- A new suite of waters has been added where anglers may retain an additional five brook trout in their daily possession limit of trout (10 brook trout possession waters).

Additionally, a new registration system has been put into place for anglers who harvest a lake sturgeon or muskellunge. The lake sturgeon fishing permit and harvest tag and the muskellunge harvest tags are no longer required




or available. An angler who harvests a lake sturgeon or muskellunge is now required to report the harvest within 24 hours, either online at michigan.gov/registerfish, by calling the toll-free number 844-345-FISH (3474) or in person at any Department of Natural Resources Customer Service Center during normal state business hours with advance notice of arrival. Please note that fish registrations won't be accepted at any state fish hatcheries or DNR field offices, only at DNR Customer Service Centers.

#### Michigan DNR Fishing Tip--Fishing off piers & breakwalls offers great opportunities

Michigan's numerous piers and breakwalls offer great fishing opportunities throughout the year. Anglers often participate in this activity to target a variety of species, with trout and salmon being two of the most popular.

If you decide to partake in this type of fishing you'll need a high-quality rod and reel. Technique-wise you'll want to vary the depth and speed of your retrieves and consider fan-casting as opposed to casting perpendicular to the pier/breakwall.

There are lots of bait options to consider, including spawn bags with steelhead, trout or salmon eggs; live alewives; or night crawlers. You'll also want a long-handled net to aid in landing your catch!

As always, take plenty of safety precautions when fishing piers and breakwalls.





Always wear a seatbelt for ride-on machines, use proper safety equipment such as goggles and earplugs, and avoid loose or baggy clothing around moving parts. Even the most seasoned farmers can fall victim to mistakes by getting too comfortable.

Stay alert and make safety a priority this spring. Good luck and happy farming!

For people who live near farms but may not be familiar with the industry, please use caution when passing farm equipment or workers operating near roads. A smart farmer will have all of their reflective gear and safety lights in working condition, but low visibility weather or distracted driving can cause hazardous situations.



#### Handy Board to decide on rezoning of property & zoning amendment tied to proposed gas-fired electric plant

Two agenda items connected to a proposed gas-fired electrical plant in southeast Handy Township will be discussed and decided on when the township board meets on Tuesday, April 10, at 7 p.m. That regularly-scheduled monthly meeting, however, has been relocated to the auditorium of the Fowlerville Junior High School in the expectation that a sizable crowd will attend; many more than could be accommodated in the township meeting room.

One of the items is a request to rezone 125 acres in Section 36 from Agriculture Residential to Research Development. The property, owned by two local families, is located north of Mason Road and west of Truhn Road.

The other item is to amend the zoning amendment so that a gas-fired electric facility, wishing to locate in the township, could do so as a Special Use on property zoned Research Development.

Competitive Power Ventures (CPV), a private company headquartered in Maryland, is looking into the feasibility of building a plant at this site. The company has an option to purchase the land; however the property owners (the Munsell family and the Krebs family) are the ones requesting the rezoning.

The property is under consideration for this development because it is located next to the spot where two natural gas lines intersect and a valve station is being constructed that connects them. In addition, an ITC electric transmission line, running in a north-south direction, borders the property on the east side. If a plant is built at the site, then the natural gas would be used to create electricity, and the electricity would then be conveyed to the transmission line and sold to various electric providers.

When the township board initially was informed of the proposed development and its location, trustees approved a request by the supervisor, Ed Alverson, to retain a law firm that specializes in this area of the law to assist the board in handling the matter.

Alverson, in earlier comments, said that the law firm informed the board that under existing state law it cannot exclude a legal business from locating in the township and an attempt to do so would likely end up in court, be expensive, and the township would probably lose.

With that in mind, the board decided to draft an ordinance to deal with this kind of land use and spell out the criteria that has to be met in order for a gas-fired electric plant to receive a Special Use permit.

The board, as required, sent this proposed zoning amendment, along with the rezoning request and a necessary change to the master plan to the township planning commission for its consideration. A public hearing was held, highlighted by comments from people opposed to the plant locating at the site as well as those supporting the project.

The planning commission approved a motion to change the master plan. Members also recommended the property be rezoned to Research Development and the zoning ordinance amendment be adopted.

The next step was for the Livingston County Planning Board to discuss both of these proposals and make their own recommendations. At a meeting on March 21, the same mix of comments in support and opposition to the project were heard during the Call to the Public. The board then approved a motion to recommend that the property be rezoned and the zoning ordinance amendment be approved.

With those two bodies having made their recommendations, the process is now back before the township board with its members set to make a final decision on both agenda items.

If the rezoning request is approved, then the company will begin dealing with county, state, and federal agencies on various matters, including how emissions are dispersed into the air as well as withdrawing groundwater for use in the plant and disposal of the left-over wastewater, any protected wildlife or plants that might be impacted, and drainage. During this phase, CPV will learn what needs to be done to obtain these necessary permits. At the same time, the company would need to design the plant and surrounding property so that it meets the requirements of the township's Special Use permit. The associated costs with doing all of this are also part of CPV's research.

In earlier comments, John Hafner, the project manager for Competitive Power Ventures, said the company will take around two years to complete its due diligence.

If CPV does green light the project, the township planning commission would be back in the process when a site plan is submitted for its consideration.
