> personal recognizance bond. A probable cause hearing has been scheduled for Nov. 29 before Judge Suzanne Geddis to determine if there is sufficient evidence to bind the defendant over to Circuit Court.

> Huck has been charged with 'Abandoning or Cruelty to 10 or More Animals', a felony punishable by up to four years in prison and \$5,000 in fines, as well as with misdemeanor charges for failing to bury the dead animals, owning a dog that was not properly held in leash, and not having a license for that same dog.

A warrant to arrest Huck had been issued on Oct. 25 by the District Court. However, the accused says that he didn't own Livingston County Prosecuting Attorney's office, based on an investigation by the Livingston County Animal Control Dept.

The arrest warrant was not served, however. Instead, Huck and Keith Edwin Huck, Jr., 61, a resident of Cohoctah Township, his attorney Linda Walker voluntarily appeared in District Court

for the arraignment.

Huck, in a brief interview with the *Fowlerville News* & *Views* last Wednesday and in a written statement he and Walker plan to introduce at the hearing, said that he hasn't lived at the Robb Road address since July of last year (2016), had no ownership interest in the property, has never owned 70 cows, and has no knowledge of who owned the cattle that died.

"Keith did live at that address with another person, but left nearly a year-and-a-half ago and said that he hasn't been back to the property since then," said Walker.

The Fowlerville-based attorney has also obtained a copy of a property deed that shows that the person who owned the property when Huck lived there had signed a transfer of ownership on Dec. 2, 2016 which was recorded at the Register of Deeds later that month.

The felony complaint submitted by the investigating officer to the District Court indicated that "on or about May 21, 2017 and August 31, 2017, in Livingston County the defendant contrary to law" committed the alleged offense. The complaint also listed several witnesses that officers had identified concerning the case. It does not indicate when Animal Control learned of the dead cows or how they made this discovery.

William Vailliencourt, the Livingston County Prosecutor, in an interview last Thursday, declined to give many specific details on the case, explaining that process of the arraignment, followed by the probable cause hearing needed to take place. "We'll see what is presented at that time," he said, adding that the defendant will have the opportunity at this hearing to offer his information.

A news story about the alleged crime had been published in the *Livingston Daily Press Argus* on Sunday, Nov. 5, in which Vailliencourt did offer a couple of details. One was that "three pigs and five cows were recovered alive and approximately 70 cows were found dead and that the animals were found in two locations."

Huck and his attorney said that he did own the three pigs and five cows and that they were kept at his farm on Fleming Road, near Gannon Road (presumably the second location mentioned in the article). The Robb Road location, which is in Conway Township, is south of Hayner Road and about two-and-a-half to three miles from where Huck's farm is located

Huck stated that these animals were taken about three weeks ago, adding that he was not present at the time. He

stated that he found a business card that was left behind by Animal Control officers, further stating that he called the phone number, but didn't get a return call.

The complaint does not specify whether or not the pigs and cows that were alive are included in the felony charge.

The unlicensed dog, listed in two of the misdemeanors in the complaint, was located at the farm as well, according to

Walker, in her comments, said that her client learned a warrant had been issued for his arrest for animal cruelty from the news article. She also said that she has talked with a neighbor of Huck's farm, noting the neighbor felt the (five) cattle were "in good shape."

In the *Press Argus* article, Vailliencout had said he was "unable to disclose other details while the case is pending, including how the animals may have died." In the interview with the *News & Views*, he confirmed this information, but reiterated that other specific information about the case would be presented at the hearing and that this was the proper process to follow.

Fowlerville Cross Country runner caps four-year career with All-State honors **By Aaron Rickens**

Chris Davis, a senior member of the Fowlerville Cross Country Team, capped off an amazing four-year career by earning All-State honors at the MHSAA Division II State Finals held at Michigan International Speedway on Saturday, Nov. 4. Davis completed the rain-soaked 5000m state championship course in 16:20.9 to become the first Fowlerville boy to earn All-State honors in 19 years. Former Fowlerville standout Nick Carson was the last to earn the honors in 1998.

The race wasn't all smooth running for Davis. The Boys Division II race was delayed 45 minutes due to lightning and heavy rain which turned the course slow and sloppy. The first mile was one of Davis' slowest of the season as he crossed the timing mats in 5:27 and in 151st position.

From there, Davis started to gain momentum on the rolling second mile of the technical MIS course. As Davis approached the two mile timing mats, he had moved up significantly to 49th place with a time of 10:36. He negative split the hardest part of the course with a time of 5:10.

As Davis entered back into the infield at MIS, he was in position to move into the Top 30 runners. With a kilometer to go, Davis was still on the outside looking in, running in 39th place. His career on the line, Davis decided to go all out to the finish by dropping a 5:17 last mile split and overcoming nine other athletes to finish the race in 30th place, edging out a competitor from Corunna by 0.005 seconds to claim his first All-State honor!

Chris's season is not done yet as he has plans to compete in the MITCA Team Michigan qualification race this weekend (Nov. 11) in Shepherd where the Top 10 senior runners will be given the opportunity to represent the state of Michigan at the Mid-East Meet of Champions later in the month. Davis will then travel to Racine, WI to compete in the Foot Locker Cross Country Midwest Regional in late November.



The regular firearm season runs from Nov. 15-30; archery season will resume once more from Dec. 1 – Jan. 1; and muzzle loading deer season runs from Dec. 1-10 in zones 1 and 2, and Dec. 1-17 in zone 3.

For more information on Michigan's hunting zones, restrictions, licensing fees and more, please see the 2017 Michigan Hunting and Trapping Digest found at www.michigan.gov. For residents who still need to purchase a hunting license in preparation for the 2017 season, you can buy yours at a local licensing agent or online at www.mdmr-elicense.com.

Since the state started tracking hunting incidents in the 1940s, the last three seasons have been the safest in Michigan's recorded history with only two fatal accidents taking place during those years. This trend toward safer hunting seasons in Michigan is one I am happy to report on and, whether you are a seasoned hunter or just now taking part in this wonderful tradition for the first time, I encourage everyone to take a moment and review the general safety tips that you first learned in your mandatory hunter safety courses — such as treating every firearm as if it is loaded, being certain of your target and what is down range, and always wearing hunter orange.

Back to Work

I typically do not talk too much about my personal life in my articles. I just don't see a need to do so. I would much rather focus on the issues at hand. However, even in such a short amount of time, I am completely frustrated with the privileged and elitist mentality that pervades that environment and am so very excited to return to the "full workforce." I should preface by saying that that description does not apply to all. Certainly, there are many good and hard-working people in our colleges, but unfortunately, there are also a lot of people who see themselves as superior simply because they attended college. There is a great amount of disdain for the so-called working class. So many in college look down on workers and think of themselves as more intelligent and better people. It is ludicrous.

College has its benefits. It can help people advance their skills. But in no way does it elevate you above the rest of the population and make you superior to those who did not go to college. Real experience is gained outside of the protected confines of the university. It is among those people where you learn the realities of life and discover the hard-working vitality of America

They are the ones who keep the US going. I have a friend who is nearing the end of high school and is considering a career as an electrician. He doesn't really have much of a desire to go to college, and that is perfectly fine. I respect that position a great deal. He is not ashamed of wanting to learn a trade and make his way in the world largely outside the restrictions of academia.

I am very thankful for my college education. I am glad that I pursued a bachelor's degree. But I am sick and tired of being surrounded by people who consider themselves to be elites. I do not consider myself to be superior because I am soon to be a college graduate. It gave me some added skills and qualifications, but it is not what defines me. And if those current students or faculty who consider themselves to be above the "common man" ever leave the realm of the university, they will discover the true realities of life that they never understood. They will discover the hard-working heart of America. And I am so very excited to soon be able to once again focus my full attention on that element of life.

Where Will You Spend Eternity?

When God our savior revealed his kindness and love, he saved us, not by works of righteousness that we have done but on the basis of his mercy, through the washing of the new birth and the renewing of the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us in full measure through Jesus Christ our Savior. And so, since we have been justified by his grace, we become heirs with the confident expectation of eternal life (Titus 3:5-7).

The most important question you could ever ask is, 'What must I do to be saved?' The Bible tells us that everyone has sinned, and we all come up short when we measure our righteousness by God's standards. Therefore, no one can boast about how good they are, and use that as criteria for entrance into the kingdom.

I have wrestled with this issue for most of my Christian life.

I know the scripture tells us that it is by faith and belief in Jesus that we are saved, but I still find myself feeling as if I need to do more in order to be the person God created me to be.

In his book, How Good is Good Enough, Andy Stanley raises some very interesting questions about whether or not good people go to heaven.

Most people who believe in God and have a fair amount of knowledge of scripture still live as though it is by their effort that they will secure their place in heaven. Some people keep themselves busy with well-meaning tasks that from all appearances, looks as if they're really on fire for the Lord, when in actuality they're trying to balance the scale in their

If we could increase our chances of going to heaven by simply doing more good than bad, then Jesus died for nothing. But thanks to God it is not true. No amount of good deeds or services we perform in the church or any other place will make our chances of going to heaven any better than anyone else's.

All of us owe a debt that we can never repay. God knows this, which is the reason Jesus had to die. Our sin had to be atoned for with the blood of a human sacrifice, and Jesus was the only one capable of being that sacrifice, because he is the only one who has never sinned.

Contrary to popular belief, as most educated people believe, being good is not a prerequisite for getting into heaven. Please don't misinterpret this. I'm not telling anyone they shouldn't do good things or treat others fairly, all I'm saying is that when your life is finished here on earth, how good you were will not be a part of the determining factor which grants you entry into the kingdom.

Scripture teaches that no amount of human goodness, human works, human morality, or religious activity can gain acceptance with God or get anyone into heaven. The moral man, the religious man, and the immoral and non-religious are all on the same playing field. All of us fall short of God's perfect righteousness.

But don't give up hope, because there is good news and that good news is in the message of the gospel. It's the message of the gift of God's own Son who became man, lived a sinless life, died on the cross for our sin, and was raised from the grave, proving both the fact that he is God's Son and the value of his death for us as our substitute.

The Bible says in 2 Corinthians 5:21: God made the one who knew no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we would become the righteousness of God.

And in 1 Peter 3:18 he says: Because Christ also suffered once for sins, the just for the unjust, to bring you to God, by being put to death in the flesh but by being made alive in the spirit.

Jesus has already bridged the gap between God and humans by giving his life so that we might have life eternal. He's already paid our debt and the only thing he asks for in return is that we accept him for who he is, confess and turn from our sins, then live according to what he teaches us in the gospels.

All of us who dream of going to heaven and spending eternity with Jesus must each come to God the same way: (1) as a sinner who recognizes his sinfulness, (2) as someone who realizes no human works can result in salvation, and (3) relying totally on Christ alone and by faith alone for our salvation.

God's marvelous plan of salvation is quite simple. Unfortunately, because we have two natures that we're trying to please, we sometimes make things more complicated than they should be. On one side we have our spiritual nature where we want to please God and live by the two great commandments which are to love God with all of our hearts, our mind and our strength. And the second, which is equally as important, is to love our neighbor just as Jesus loves us.

On the other side, we have our human nature where we allow the things of our fleshly desires to rise and become more important than the things of the Spirit. It is a battle that has been waging since sin entered the world.

There is only one way we can win the battle and that is to recognize that Jesus is the only way of salvation! Understand that Jesus took our sin upon himself and that he died in our place, taking the punishment that we deserve. Jesus died so that we could live. If we place our faith in Jesus, trusting in his death as the payment for our sins, all of our sins are forgiven and cleansed forever. Because of Jesus' resurrection we know that we will have life after we die—a resurrected life in heaven where we will spend eternity with Jesus!

You don't have to wonder about where you will spend your eternity. Accept Christ today and guarantee your place in God's Kingdom.

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life (John 3:16).



The Fowlerville Varsity Volleyball Team finished up a strong season this year placing 2nd in the league behind Lansing Catholic for the second year in a row. The girls were 8-2 for their league season with their only two losses coming from LC.

Michigan House Report

A bill I introduced to require adult foster care facilities to comply with Physician Orders for Scope of Treatment (POST) form was signed into law by the governor this week. The legislation is part of a four-bill package designed to ensure patients' wishes are respected during end-of-life care. The POST form is developed with the help of the patient's family and doctor. We have a responsibility to safeguard patients' wishes at the most vulnerable time of their lives. My bill states that if an adult foster care facility is unable to comply with a patient's POST form, it must transfer the patient to another care facility. The bipartisan bills received overwhelming support in both the House and Senate and I'm proud to see it signed into law.

I had the pleasure of hosting Zachary Kupec of Howell, who is one of the winners of my Summer Reading Program, and his parents at the Capitol on Wednesday. He had the very special honor of being sworn in as "junior representative" and experience the life of a Michigan state legislator. During his day in Lansing, Zachary sat with me on the House floor and observed the legislative process firsthand. I am impressed by his passion for reading and encouraged by his interest in our state government.

As the Nov. 15 firearm deer season opener nears, the Michigan DNR encourages hunters to brush up on safety tips

to ensure a safe, enjoyable experience:
--Treat every firearm as if it is loaded and always point the muzzle in a safe direction.

--Keep the safety on and your finger away from the trigger and outside the trigger guard until you are ready to fire.

--Be certain of your target and what's beyond it before firing.

--Know the identifying features of the game you hunt.

--Make sure you have an adequate backstop. Don't shoot at a flat, hard surface or water.

--Unload firearms before running, climbing a fence or tree or jumping a ditch.

--Wear a safety harness when hunting from an elevated platform. Use a haul line to bring the unloaded firearm up and down the raised platform.

--Avoid alcohol and drugs before or during a hunt.

--Ensure at least one article of clothing is hunter orange and at least half of any camouflage pattern is too, even if hunting on private land.

--Let someone know where you are hunting and when you will return to help rescuers locate you should you become injured or lost.

--Carry a cell phone. Not only to call for help if necessary, but newer phones emit a signal that can help rescuers locate you.

By court rule (MCR 8.110), a chief judge is the presiding officer of the court and also has "administrative superintending power and control over the judges of the court and all court personnel." These responsibilities include caseload management and disposition of judicial workloads, supervision of all court personnel and finances, and other critical functions.

"We look to our chief judges to manage the administrative affairs of their courts, demonstrate and encourage the highest standards of judicial conduct, and ensure that all persons who have business in our courthouses are treated with courtesy and respect," said Chief Justice Stephen J. Markman.

"Judge Cavanaugh is committed to administering justice with fairness, equality, and integrity, to resolving matters before the court in a timely manner with trained and motivated staff, and to providing courteous and prompt service in a manner that inspires public trust and confidence" it was

Democratic Gubernatorial, Attorney General Candidates to be in Livingston

A pair of candidates for top statewide office will speak to Livingston County Democrats later this month.

Ann Arbor entrepreneur Shri Thanedar, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, and Dana Nessel, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for attorney general, both will speak at the party's Nov. 30 meeting.

Thanedar is a political newcomer who emigrated from India in 1979 and went on to found several companies in an upand-down business career that survived the Great Recession. Thanedar, who has a doctorate in chemistry, bought a small lab in Missouri that he expanded to 450 employees before the Great Recession sent it into receivership. He moved to Michigan in 2010 and started a chemical-testing company called Avomeen Analytical Services. In 2017, he sold his majority stake in the company and rewarded roughly 50 employees with \$1.5 million in bonuses.

While establishing his businesses, he lost his first wife in 1996 and raised his two sons as a single parent. He also is a best-selling author, having written his memoirs, The Blue Suitcase, both in Marathi and in English. He has been a U.S. citizen since 1988.

His honors include having his company named to Inc. magazine's list of 5000 fastest growing companies in the U.S. and being named Entrepreneur of the Year.

Nessel is an attorney who spearheaded the precedentsetting case, DeBoer v. Snyder, which challenged the bans on adoption and marriage for same-sex couples in Michigan. The DeBoer case was later consolidated with other cases and resulted in a landmark ruling that legalized same-sex marriage nationwide.

A former assistant prosecutor in the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, Nessel handled child sexual and physical abuse cases, shootings of civilians by police officers, and auto theft.

In 2005, she began her own law practice in criminal defense, civil rights actions against police departments and government agencies, and protecting victims of domestic violence. She also has taken on cases for the LGBTQ community including ones dealing with child custody, adoption, and wrongful prosecutions and employment terminations based on sexual orientation and gender identity.

A graduate of Wayne State University Law School, Nessel has received numerous awards for her civil rights initiatives, including the "Champion of Justice" award from the Michigan State Bar Association, "Woman of the Year" from Michigan Lawyers Weekly and the "Treasure of Detroit" award from Wayne State University Law School.

Pastor considers himself "blessed" to have opportunity to serve at Fowlerville **First United Methodist Church**

In the spring of 2016, Scott Herald—the current pastor at the Fowlerville First United Methodist Church—said "yes" to a question. He had just turned 57, a time of life when many people are looking towards retirement rather than striking out on a new path.

The question had been posed by Mark Spaw, the District Superintendent of the United Methodist Church and, noted

Scott, "He had been asking it every time we met for about a year."

And the question? "He would ask me: Are you ready to become a pastor?" said

Herald had become a lay servant at Trinity United Methodist Church in 2010—a church in Iosco Township that he and his family had been attending since they moved to the Fowlerville area in 1990. From there he had taken classes and become a certified lay speaker, a status that allowed him to serve as a guest speaker at churches in the Ann Arbor District.

"As a lay servant at Trinity, I got the opportunity to preach and found that this is where my passion is," he said. "In the Methodist Church's 2012

need to complete in order to become a certified lay speaker. I pursued that over the next three years and in 2015 became the first person to complete the 2012 Book in the Ann Arbor District and the third one in the Detroit Conference.

"After that, on an average of every six-to-eight weeks I'd speak at a church," he said. "The district goes from Oak Grove to the Ohio border, so it's a large area and includes a variety of churches. I enjoyed it immensely."

It was also when the district superintendent began urging him to consider the next step. But it was not a step he was quite ready to take. Since graduating from South Lyon High School in 1977, Herald had worked at a number of different companies with a common theme being computers and electronics and involvement in production and maintenance.

"When I was in high school, I attended the Southwest Oakland Vocational Education Center and earned a Technical Degree in Industrial Electronics," he said. "This gave me a

the specific classes that you in Fowlerville, a community of faith he has served since July of 2016.


job skill when I graduated."

While he took some classes at Washtenaw Community College, his training in electronics earned him a job in the engineering department at Seamless Tube where he worked for a couple of years.

During this time frame—1979 to be exact—he and Judy (Hill) were married. "We were classmates in high school and sat next to each other in study hall," he recalled. "Our first date was at McDonald's and on our second date I took her to church. My parents were Methodists, and I grew up attending the Methodist church in South Lyon."

His next career move was a job in the engineering and production departments at Northern Telecom in Ann Arbor. Among the products produced by this firm were computer hard drives. "I was there for over 10 years," Herald noted.

There were positions at a couple of other companies during the ensuing years before he was hired at Revspring

around 2008, a firm in Novi that printed, folded, and stuffed collection letters. "We did about a million letters a day," he said. "I worked on the computer side."

So there he was, weighting the comfort and security of a career and serving as a guest speaker at neighboring churches weighed against the question from the district superintendent: Are you ready to become a pastor?

So what prompted him to finally say "yes"?

"Judy was taking lay servant class in Howell," Scott said. "I was on my way to attend the graduation ceremony and, as I was driving, I kept hearing the word 'yes' in my head. As I was pulling into the parking lot of the church, I heard 'say yes'. The district superintendent had been asking me for a year if I was ready to become a local pastor, explaining that there were churches going without pastors. I knew he was going to ask me again."

But, as Scott continued his story, he pointed out that he did not rush over to the superintendent, shouting "Yes, I will." Instead, he found a seat in the back of the room, not making his presence known to the superintendent who was sitting at a table with his back to the door.

"Within five minutes, without turning around, Mark knew I was there," said Scott. "He greeted me and asked again if I was ready. When I said "yes," he looked a bit shocked. But quickly recovered and began making plans."

Scott has no doubt where the voice in his head came from or what had happened in that church room—he was answering God's call, accepting God's plan for him at this stage in his life.

It was similar to the call that had prompted him to become a lay servant six years earlier. "Bob Miller had become the pastor at Trinity," Scott said. "He had been the principal engineer for a company in Brighton when he got the call to become a pastor. He was someone I related to. He presented me with the idea of becoming a lay servant. Judy had been very active in the church but, while I attended and participated, I wasn't as involved.

"I love bow hunting for deer and had been doing so for over 30 years," he continued. "I had always taken a week off to hunt with two of my friends. But the first lay servant class was the same weekend for bow hunting. I chose to go to class. There's a question that Jesus asks Peter when he invites Peter to join his ministry: How much do you love me? By going to that class rather than deer hunting, I was giving my answer. When I said 'yes' to becoming a pastor, I was doing as Peter did."

What Scott was agreeing to do was become a Licensed Local Pastor. Under the United Methodist Church there are Ordained Pastors (or Ministers) who have successfully completed an undergraduate course of studies at a seminary. They are appointed to a church and are usually reassigned to a new church every few years. In addition, they can perform weddings and funerals and administer communion at other churches. They also, in more practical terms, have some job protections.

A Licensed Local Pastor is appointed to a church and their duties are limited to that specific locale. The person also serves at the pleasure of the bishop. In addition, a course of study must be pursued that, while done on a part-time basis, takes five years.

Scott noted that after accepting this new path, events moved at an expectedly rapid pace and took an unanticipated direction. "Two weeks later Mark called me and asked if I was sitting down. He told me that he had a church for me and that it was Fowlerville First United Methodist. The church needed a pastor and he said he was assigning me to fill it."



MSU jazz octets perform at Alverson Center for Performing Arts

On Wednesday, Nov. 1, the top two jazz octets from Michigan State University performed a free concert in the Alverson Center for Performing Arts at Fowlerville High School. These octets, comprised of jazz studies majors at MSU, tour the state annually and have made it a habit of coming to Fowlerville. The audience of community members and students were treated to amazing musicianship on display from both performing ensembles. FHS looks forward to hosting these groups again next year.

That assignment went into effect July 1, 2016, and the next day (a Sunday) he gave his first sermon to the congregation. Also, having learned that he would be a pastor, Scott gave his notice at Revspring—ending that employment in June.

A few weeks later, on Nov. 14, Bishop David Bard appointed him as a Licensed Local Pastor, making the assignment official. Last year Scott also began his required studies, noting that he started out by taking four courses at the Methodist Theological Seminary in Ohio. "The classes are every quarter," he added.

"I've been blessed!" is how Pastor Scott describes this opportunity. "You could say it's a second career, but I prefer to think of it as a second opportunity to share the love and grace of Jesus Christ. Looking back, I realize in how many different ways I was being prepared by God for this calling."

After nearly a year-and-a-half of being a pastor, he said that he's "come to appreciate the many other aspects of the job that I hadn't thought about before." He noted that, along with offering the sermon at Sunday worship, there are the visits to the more elderly members of the congregation as well as those who are ill or undergoing surgery. Church suppers, special activities like Vacation Bible School, and a lot of meetings also keep him busy.

Fowlerville United Methodist also has outreach ministries, including Heartstrings Preschool which operates in the church's basement, and the Mission House which is a meeting place for members of the community working at overcoming substance abuse.

"In my secular life there was work, family, and church, and I compartmentalized them," he said. "What I've experienced as a pastor is that everything bleeds over. Wherever I go, I'm a pastor and I'm representing my church."

Pastor Scott said that his wife, Judy, has been a great helpmate with this new venture. "She works for Tax Management Associates in Brighton and has been doing so for 10 years," Pastor Scott said. "But during her non-work hours, she is very involved in the church. She's a natural at this—more so than I am."

The couple has three sons—all them graduates of Fowlerville High School. Joshua, 32, and his wife reside in Alaska where he works in oil services. They have a one-year-old son, Gideon. Andrew,

31, is a farmer and resides in nearby Marion Township, south of Howell. Scott, 28, who was married this past March, works at General Motor's Warren Tech Center and lives in Flat Rock

Pastor Scott said that being part of Fowlerville First United Methodist Church has been exciting. "For the size of the congregation the number of things that this community of faith does is unreal," he said. "They are so generous."
