Michigan House Report

By Dr. Hank Vaupel, 47nd District

I'm excited to announce the bipartisan House mental health task force, which I was pleased to co-chair, released its recommendations to make improvements to Michigan's broken mental health system in a report earlier this past week.

My colleagues and I on the task force spent five months taking part in public meetings and site visits across Michigan, reviewing areas where vulnerable residents are lacking in care and resources and collecting feedback to learn how best to deliver meaningful solutions.

The conclusions we reached in this report are solutions to problems brought forth by real people, officials and organizations impacted by mental health care in Michigan. These stories helped us understand the everyday needs of the mental health community.

It was an honor to have the opportunity to help lead this very important task force. This attention to Michigan's broken mental health system is long overdue and it was a high priority for me heading into my second term.

The task force report not only serves as a blueprint for policy changes and legislation to be introduced in the next several months, but also establishes a framework to further enhance mental health services in the future.

Some of the proposed solutions in the report include:

- --Eliminating barriers to increase access to mental health care;
- --Creating a statewide crisis hotline to connect people in need with local services;
- --Establishing incentives to encourage hospitals to create and expand psychiatric wards and help drive professionals to work in underserved areas;
 - --Improving training for first responders;

--Providing additional treatment to convicts with mental health challenges during and after incarceration.

God is Our Refuge

You are my refuge and my shield; I have put my hope in your word (Psalm 119:114 NIV).

Everyone who lives will at one time or another experience some form of misfortune or encounter situations that baffle us to the point of not knowing what to do. When trouble finds you, how do you handle it? Do you turn to other people? Do you try to handle it yourself?

Do you try to wait for the season to pass?

I have found that the best way to handle trouble or unexpected, unpleasant circumstances when they come upon us is to turn to the Word of God. The scriptures have a calming presence when we sit down and read them with the intent of finding Jesus in the midst of our reading.

For the past few weeks I have been dealing with a mild form of depression. At first I thought it was because of a situation with my health. But after seeing the doctor and finding out my condition is not something I need to be too concerned about, I still don't feel the joy I was feeling before I became depressed. For He says in Hebrews 13:4-6: "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you." So we say with confidence, "The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid.

And God never breaks a promise.

For the rest of this article I will share with you something that is near and dear to my heart. The program of Celebrate Recovery (CR). We have just started our third year.

Some people hear the word recovery and instantly, they connect it to alcohol and drugs. Please do not make that mistake. Livingston County Sheriff Office apprehends suspect in bank robbery





Why the small things matter

It starts with your shoes

We do something very odd and unique at our karate school - we take off our shoes. Did you ever wonder why?

Well some of it is because of tradition. Another reason might be because it helps keep the dojo floor clean. But I think there is an even more powerful reason we take off our shoes and I would like to share it with the sincere hope it changes how you think and what you do. In the end I think you will discover, this one seemingly simple task can profoundly change your child.

A good way to answer this is with some advice Navy Seal Admiral William McRaven gave as the 2014 commencement speaker at the University of Texas. The video of his speech went viral and you can easily view it on YouTube. Many say it was one of the best graduation speeches ever given. In it he shared the 10 life lessons he learned as a Navy Seal. The

1. "If you want to change the world, start off by making your bed!"

The reason - this is the very first thing you do each day. He went on to say "If you can't do the little things right, you will never do the big things right." To change the world and be a leader you have to be able to do the small repetitious mundane things well.

Back to the karate school. We are here to help you develop the attitudes and character traits of the highly successful in your child. You can talk to your child until you are blue in the face. You can teach or show them what to do but most will never develop or embody these attitudes and character traits unless they experience them. Kids can only learn by doing. Can you imagine your child focused, intentional and driven to do everything, and especially the small things, perfectly every time? You get them started strong at the dojo and we will do the rest. After their class, hold them to a high standard in how they leave. No throwing their uniforms at you! No lost belts or gear! Remember the last thing you do

How can you develop this "small things" lesson at home? How anyone

starts their day is huge. Is your home where everything goes like clockwork all the way until you kiss them good bye in the morning. Or, does your morning start with you having to nag them repeatedly to get up? Do they complain or struggle as they get dressed and ready? Is it a challenge to get them to eat breakfast? Are you looking for lost things? Are you typically in a state of stress as you realize they are going to be late for school or the bus? Have you ever had a child that just starts the day badly and this same energy/emotion stays with them the rest of their day

So, back to what you can do. Do they make their beds? One of my pet peeves is waking themselves up for school. Get them their own alarm clock. Teach your child the process and routine of starting strong. Do the small things well. Is this hard work on your part? Yes it is!

How about school? Ask your child or their teacher - what are the small repetitive but important things my child needs to do especially at the start of their school day? What are your routines and procedures for homework/reading at home?

In your child's karate class we do new things but if you notice we do many, many small things over and over the same way in almost every class. There is a method to our madness. Do you know another word for these simple mundane tasks done repeatedly over time? They are your "HABITS"! ... What habits are your child developing?

It is worth repeating this quote from Mahatma Gandhi:

"Your beliefs become your thoughts, Your thoughts become your words, Your words become your actions, Your actions become your habits, Your habits become your character, Your character become your destiny."




Acoustic Café to feature Marty Montgomery & The Martini Band



Michigan Senate Report

Michigan winters are long, but also a beautiful treasure for outdoor enthusiasts. One of the most popular winter pastimes

But did you know that in Michigan all snowmobiles must be registered unless used on private property? A three-year registration is issued for \$30 by the secretary of state. The registration is valid from Oct. 1 when it's purchased to Sept. 30 of the third year. The registration number is printed on the three-year snowmobile decal. Snowmobile decals must be displayed on each side of the forward half of the cowl above the foot-well of the snowmobile.

In addition to registration with the secretary of state, residents and non-residents who operate a snowmobile in Michigan are required to purchase a snowmobile trail permit. The trail permit enables snowmobilers to ride state-designated trails, public roads and public lands where authorized. It is valid for one year, which begins Oct. 1 and ends Sept. 30 of the following year. State-designated trails are open Dec. 1 through March 31 and grooming occurs when there is enough snow on the ground.

Michigan's snowmobile program is 100 percent funded by trail permits and registration fees —dollars that pay for grooming, signage, maintenance, bridge and culvert construction, new equipment, liability insurance, maintenance of trailhead amenities (signage, bathrooms, plowing of parking lots) and other essentials that make Michigan a destination for snowmobile lovers.

Stay safe, stay warm and have a great time on the trails that your registration and trail permits help maintain.

Here is everything we have been able to discern about the photo so far: It is a panoramic black and white photograph. It is a school photo with both students and teachers present. The group is standing in front of the Union School on the west side of North Collins Street. The Union School once stood just to the north of where the Senior Center building stands today. It was built in 1891 and was torn down in 1957.

Also visible in the background is the three-story schoolhouse that was built in 1923 and torn down in 1996. Thanks to the presence of these two buildings in the photo, we know that the photograph must have been taken between 1923 and 1957.

Clothing and hair styles can also be a clue to when a photo was taken. The sailor dresses worn by many of the girls in the photo are a big clue as this style of dress was very popular as a school uniform in the 1920's and 30's. However, this is still a large range of dates and does not offer any definitive proof of when the photo was taken.

If the photo pictured here looks familiar to you, we would love to hear anything you can tell us about it! Please feel free to stop by the library to take a closer look. The photo is hanging on the wall in our computer lab above the copy machine, along with several other historical photos. Thank you in advance for your help Fowlerville!





cared for," Snyder said.

Members will serve four-year terms expiring Dec. 31, 2021. Kennedy will represent the general public on the board.

Asked about the appointment, Kennedy said, "It got around the office of my interest and background in agriculture. I was in 4-H for 12 years, which is how I got the appointment to the Farm Bureau Board. Being a former exhibitor at the Livestock Expo, I was chosen to bring that perspective to our meetings. This is my second year on that board."

The Livestock Expo is held at the Livestock Pavilion, located on the Michigan State University campus, in mid-July. Over the course of five days, young exhibitors up to the age of 21 show beef cattle, goats, sheep, and hogs.

She also recently became a volunteer at the Ingham County Animal Shelter.

While all of that is deserving of recognition, Kennedy's day job is even more noteworthy. For the past few years, beginning in June 2013, she has worked fulltime in the Governor's Executive Office and is currently the Deputy Press Secretary. Prior to that she spent several months as an intern at the office.

"Much of the work of this office involves constituent relations," Kennedy said. "We call ourselves the state customer service office. We handle questions or concerns that people contact us about. We assist them in navigating the state departments and agencies. Citizens also call us to express their opinion on pending legislation."

While Kennedy has dealt with those matters as a member of the staff, for almost three years now she has worked with the governor and first lady.

"I've been the communications representative for Gov. Snyder since the summer of 2015," she pointed out. "With my background in writing, I help with tributes and proclamations that the governor presents, letters of recognition, and prepare

Kennedy also serves as the media spokesperson for the first lady. "I do press releases on her planned activities and," she said. "I also prepare briefings for her, help with speeches, and coordinate media interviews."

That assistance has included helping Sue Snyder in her effort to draw attention to finding a cure for breast cancer and the problem of sexual assaults on college campuses.

"Each first lady has a special project she focuses on," noted Kennedy. "Mrs. Snyder, being a breast cancer survivor, started with that cause. But four years ago she added campus sexual assault. What I've learned has been an eye opener. It's been a rewarding experience to work with the first lady to draw attention to this problem."

JORDAN, WHO WAS BORN ON AUGUST 28, 1990,

spent her first ten years living with her family in Fayette, Ohio, a small town just south of the Michigan border.

"I have two older brothers, Justin and Zak, and a younger sister, Morgan," she noted.

Her father, Jim Kennedy, worked in logistics for Federal



Express (he still does), while her mother, Robin, at that time was a stay-at-home mom who also home-schooled her children.

'We lived near a huge farm that raised hogs and my brothers started showing swine, purchased from the place, as 4-H'ers in the Fulton County Fair," Jordan recalled. "When I was old enough I also had pigs at the fair."

Fayette would have continued being her home, except that her father's job was transferred to Metro Detroit. That meant finding a new place to live.

"Our family had gotten the 4-H bug," she said. "We wanted to live in a rural area where we could have livestock. My parents found a place on East Lovejoy Road north of Fowlerville. It has four acres and included a farm house and a gorgeous, large barn. The barn burned down about four years ago, but a new one was built."

Growing up in her new home, Jordan belonged to the Barnyard Bunch 4-H Club, showed sheep and pigs at the Fowlerville Fair, and exhibited the pigs at the Michigan State Fair when it was in operation along with the Livestock Expo.

"I was in 4-H until I reached the maximum age of 18 and continued showing at the state level until I was 21," she said.

Highlights included having the Champion Hog at the fair in 2007 and the Champion Lamb for four straight years. "At Livestock Expo, I won the Champion Hog in my final years of eligibility," Jordan said. "It was a great way to go out."

Those years were not all devoted to her livestock projects. She noted that she participated in a Home School Sports League, playing volleyball, and took guitar lessons. There was also an interest in writing.

After completing her high school studies, Jordan attended Lansing Community College for a year to complete her basic classes. She then transferred to Spring Arbor University in Spring Arbor (near Jackson) where she studied communications, focusing on advertising and public relations.

"I wrote for the college newspaper," she said. "I was also part of the student government. One of the jobs I had, which I got paid for, was advertising and marketing special events we put on. I also was part of the phone-a-thon where we called alumni to raise money for scholarships."

It was during a 'Women in Leadership' event at the college, which Jordan helped promote, that she got the opportunity that led to her current position.

"One of the participants was a lady who worked in the governor's office," Jordan recalled. "I approached her during one of the breakout sessions and asked if there might be an opportunity to work there as an intern. She encouraged me to apply for a position.

"And, as they say, the rest is history," Jordan said.

She served as an intern during her final semester at Spring Arbor in the Fall of 2012. After graduation, she continued on a part-time basis as an intern and also worked at the Ralph Lauren store in Tanger Outlets in Howell. Then that June she began working fulltime at the office.

But this tenure will soon end. Her job at the office and as deputy press secretary ends this coming December when Gov. Snyder leaves office—a fate she shares with the rest of

"It'll be tough," she said. "I've really enjoyed working with the governor and first lady. I believe that Michigan is better off since Gov. Snyder took office, and as a result of his policies and the approach he's taken. Unemployment has gone down, new jobs have been created, Michigan has experienced a turnaround, and I'm proud to be part of the team that accomplished this."

Jordan's work at the governor's office was, by law, centered on administrative and policy matters. She did, however, volunteer during her free time to help with Gov. Snyder's re-election campaign and that same year (2014) was elected

as a Precinct Delegate to the Livingston County Republican Convention.

While the coming months will no doubt be bittersweet, given that this was her first job after college, Jordan said that she's "excited about starting a new chapter."

"I'm not sure in what career direction I'll go," she continued. "I have different interests. I have this background of working in the governor's office. I've been working with Farm Bureau. I want to keep my options open. But I do want to stay in the communications' realm, and I want to stay in Michigan."

As a final comment, Jordan wished "to thank the Fowlerville and Livingston

County community" for the support they showed by purchasing her livestock market animals when she was in

"Whatever success I've had, I attribute in part to the support of these local businesses and individuals who bought my pigs and sheep at the auction," she said. "I want them to know I used the money to help pay my college expenses. I really appreciate the opportunity they gave me. I know I speak on behalf of my brothers and sister who feel the same."

from leaves to bark to gourds.

Her neighbor Raymond Bessert generously supplies her wood and log pieces that are already sanded down and ready

"My neighbor goes up north and pulls logs out of the water that beavers have actually chewed on," she explained. "He brings it back to me and then I paint a beaver on it."

For painting leaves, the process is a lengthy one. It begins in the fall with waiting for the leaves to change color. Once she picks her leaves she brings them inside and puts them in glycerin for 30 minutes. After that she will wipe them off and put them in a flower press where they will sit for six months.

Once they're ready and both sides of the leaf are sealed, she will paint them, varnish them and—last but not least laminate and cut them out.

The gourd ornaments, which Lucas said is her favorite thing to paint, are a popular item. She has painted some for almost every Michigan sports team.

She also paints lighthouses on rocks that come straight from Lake Superior.

"I know a guy who has a lighthouse on Lake Superior called Crisp Point Lighthouse and around this time of year I paint on these rocks from Lake Superior," she said. "He comes before Memorial Day to buy them and then takes them

Lucas mostly sells her work at the annual craft show held in her daughter's barn right next door to her home. The craft show is always held on the first weekend in November. This year will mark their 15th year doing it.

"There was 14 vendors in 2017 with pretty much every kind of craft you can think of," Lucas said. "There is lots of food there — the neighbor across the road is really famous for her pumpkin roll. My daughter also makes jellies and stuff like that."

In addition to selling at the craft show, Lucas also accepts custom orders. Her ornaments start at \$5 a piece while some of the bigger items could be anywhere from \$20 to \$30.

Before moving to Fowlerville in 2004, Lucas lived in Byron for 40 years. With her late husband, Jim, she had three children – Sherrie, James and Tammie. In addition to painting, Lucas also enjoys sewing and crocheting in her spare time.
