Michigan House Report

This past week the House voted to update Michigan's education curriculum standards. Michigan schools need to give children more classroom options that lead to increased job opportunities. I believe we must give students more flexibility within graduation requirements, allowing them to learn more about their career aspirations. Legislation passed by the House will add computer science and coding opportunities for students, as well as offer statistics as an equivalent to algebra II for math requirements. We're also expanding career and technical education programs to provide real-world experiences for our young people. These changes bring Michigan's education curriculum to the 21st Century. I'm proud to support these proposed changes. The bills now move to the Senate for consideration.

I attended the Michigan Association of Counties Conference reception last week. Local government plays a great role in the functionality of our state, and as a former township supervisor, I'm a huge supporter of local control. It was a pleasure to see Livingston County Commissioner Doug Helzerman at the event as well!

Legislation I introduced to remove political party icons from the ballot was approved by the House Elections and Ethics Committee this week. Political vignettes are small icons first added to the ballot in the 1890s. Ballots have changed drastically since then and the icons no longer serve a purpose. The icons don't line up with the political party they're meant to represent, and they've gotten so small that it's impossible for people to identify who or what is depicted in the picture. In addition, vignettes have confused some voters who think circling the icon is all they have to do to cast a straight-ticket vote. When people make this mistake it's a shame because their votes don't count, and everybody's vote should count. I was pleased to work on this bill with Livingston County Clerk Elizabeth Hundley, who joined me earlier this month to testify before the committee. The bill now moves to the full House for consideration.

A big thank you to Fowlerville Police Chief John Tyler for coordinating presentations on opioid awareness at United Brethren Church last week. As chair of the House Health Policy Committee, I've learned a lot about the detrimental effects opioid abuse has had across our state. Many of my colleagues are working on legislation aimed at reducing instances of overdose. I'm always supportive of legislation like this and look forward to learning about more ways to reduce these tragic incidents. We also welcomed Michigan Automated Prescription System to present on opioid prescription monitoring during the Health Policy Committee meeting this week. More education is crucial to put an end to opioid abuse.

Fowlerville High School Testing Schedule 2017!

Testing for Freshmen, Sophomores, and Juniors will begin the week of April 10, 2017!

New state law requires all 9th and 10th grade students to participate in a state summative assessment. Summative assessments measure what students are expected to know and be able to do at specific grade levels and in specific content areas.

The Michigan Merit Exam (MME) has three components and is the required assessment for 11th grade students. The MME includes the SAT, ACT WorkKeys, and M-STEP Science and Social Studies assessments.

Testing schedule for Fowlerville High School students for Tuesday, April 11, 2017:

Seniors do NOT attend school on Tuesday, April 11.

Freshmen will participate in the PSAT 8/9. Freshmen are to report to FHS for testing by 7:30 am. Testing will conclude by 11:05 am. Freshmen will then follow their 4 - 6 hour schedule and will be dismissed at 2:10 pm.

Sophomores will participate in the PSAT 10. Sophomores are to report to FHS for testing by 7:30 am. Testing will conclude by 11:05 am. Sophomores will then follow their 4 - 6 hour schedule and will be dismissed at 2:10 pm.

Juniors will participate in the SAT. Juniors are to report to FHS for testing by 7:30 am. Testing will conclude by 1:00 pm. Juniors are dismissed for the day once testing concludes.

Testing schedule for Fowlerville High School students for Wednesday, April 12, 2017:

Freshmen, Sophomores, and Seniors will follow their regular school schedule.

Juniors will report to FHS for testing by 7:30 am, where they will participate in the ACT WorkKeys. Once testing for ACT WorkKeys concludes, Juniors will attend lunch in the cafeteria. After lunch, Juniors will take the M-STEP Science followed by the M-STEP Social Studies assessments. Juniors will be dismissed at the regular time of 2:10 pm.

DON'T LET YOUR CHILD BE A

Is your child good at starting things . . . but not so good at finishing?!"

In my last article I wrote about the first part of our dojo training theme for this month "I'm not better than anyone else..." This week I get to explain the even more powerful second half of this sentence "...but no one is better than me" so you can share this with your child – on the ride home!

There are three important aspects to "...but no one is better than me!"

- 1. This first one is pretty obvious. A key to success and a characteristic of all black belts is **CONFIDENCE**. Confidence in the face of self-doubt, fear, failure or hardship. We often use the saying "Fake it until you make it!" It goes without saying, to do anything worthwhile in life it will probably be hard and take a lot of time. The only way you can consistently succeed is to have the ability to sustain your drive, energy and attitude. Never stopping until you succeed. Remember "Failure is temporary but quitting is permanent!"
- 2. The second one is a sneaky one. Without really know it, many people are lulled to sleep in life. They go through most of their life settling for good enough, average or mediocre. It is easy to see why. Society tells us to fit in. Don't rock the boat. When an employee or student starts to work hard and excel her peers say "What are you doing?! You are going to make us look bad?!" So from a very early age we are rewarded for fitting in and staying average. Not at this dojo. Here is an important black belt attitude and habit - "If I am going to do anything worthwhile I always strive to be the very best.

Not just the best at my school or dojo or job. Not just the best in the U.S. Not just the best in the world. I will be the best

3. The third one is "Don't Let Your Child Dabble". We have ruined a generation by giving them some bad advice on life and success - "Don't take that first job. Wait and follow your passion!" At 25 or 30 they are following their passion right to their parent's basement! The reason why? They have it all backwards! Passion is not what comes first. First you work really hard on something. Then you get really, really good at it. Then you fall in love with it. Then finally the passion is found. The secret to success? Don't become a dabbler especially in your 20's. But it starts when you are young. It is easy to spot the dabblers. When they are young they try a lot of different sports or activities but never stick with any of them. Later in college they change majors a dozen times. They often have difficulty staying in a committed long term relationship. When they enter the working world they cannot hold a job. 



Savvy Senior Column

The ABCs of Picking a Medicare Supplemental Policy *Dear Savvy Senior*,

Can you provide any advice on choosing a Medicare supplemental policy to help cover things outside of Medicare? I'll be 65 in a few months and could use some assistance.

Looking for Help

Dear Looking,

If you plan to enroll in original Medicare, getting a supplemental policy (also known as Medigap insurance) too is a smart idea because it will help pay for things that aren't covered by Medicare like copayments, coinsurance and deductibles. Here are some tips to help you choose an appropriate plan.

Medigap Plans

In all but three states (Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin), Medigap plans, which are sold by private health insurers, come in 10 standardized benefit packages labeled with the letters A, B, C, D, F, G, K, L, M and N.

Plan F is the most popular policy followed by plan C because they provide comprehensive coverage. Plans K and L are high-deductible policies that have lower premiums but impose higher out-of-pocket costs. Plan F also offers a high-deductible version in some states. And a popular middle ground policy that attracts many healthy beneficiaries is plan N.

For more information on the different types of plans and the coverage they provide, including Medigap options in Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, see Medicare's "Choosing a Medigap Policy" guide at *Medicare.gov/pubs/pdf/02110-medicare-medigap.guide.pdf*, or call 1-800-MEDICARE and ask them to mail you a copy.

How to Choose

To pick a Medigap policy that works best for you, consider your health, family medical history and your budget. The differences among plans can be small and rather confusing.

To help you choose, visit *Medicare.gov*, and click on "Supplements & Other Insurance" at the top of the page, then on "Find a Medigap policy" and type in your ZIP code. This will give you a list of the plans available in your area, their price ranges and the names, and contact information of companies that sell them. But it's up to you to contact the carriers directly to get there specific pricing information.

You can also compare Medigap prices on most state insurance department websites (see *NAIC.org/state_web_map.htm* for links), or you can order a personalized report from Weiss Ratings for \$99 at *WeissMedigap.com*.

Since all Medigap policies with the same letter must cover the exact same benefits (it's required by law), you should shop for the cheapest policy.

You'll get the best price if you sign up within six months

after enrolling in Medicare Part B. During this openenrollment period, an insurer cannot refuse to sell you a policy or charge you more because of your health.

You also need to be aware of the pricing methods, which will affect your costs. Medigap policies are usually sold as either: "community-rated" where everyone in an area is charged the same premium regardless of age; "issue-age-rated" that is based on your age when you buy the policy, but will only increase due to inflation, not age; and "attained-age-rated," that starts premiums low but increases as you age. Community-rate and issue-age-rated policies are the best options because they will save you money in the long run.

You can buy the plan directly from an insurance company, or you can work with a reputable local insurance broker.

Drug Coverage

You also need to know that Medigap policies do not cover prescription drugs, so if you don't have drug coverage, you need to consider buying a separate Medicare Part D drug plan too. See *Medicare.gov/find-a-plan* to compare plans. Also note that Medigap plans do not cover vision, dental care, hearing aids or long-term care either.

Alternative Option

Instead of getting original Medicare, plus a Medigap policy and a separate Part D drug plan, you could sign up for a Medicare Advantage plan that provides all-in-one coverage. These plans, which are sold by insurance companies, are generally available through HMOs and PPOs. To find and compare Advantage plans visit *Medicare.gov/find-a-plan*.

Cheryl would always say "yes" to any task I asked of her and she was more than willing to assist in the leadership of CR. She would teach a lesson, share a testimony, lead a small group, or simply sit in and give support to another leader who felt a little uncomfortable doing something for the first time. She looked forward to Tuesday night meetings and she was always on the lookout for the newcomer. She made them feel welcome and did what she could to show them the benefits of becoming a part of our CR family.

Cheryl Bolling may have passed on from this life, but during her short 63 years here on earth she left a legacy that will be remembered for a many years to come.

She made a real difference in the lives of people because of her willingness to share the love of Christ with others, her undying faith and her unending hope in Jesus Christ. My life has been truly blessed because our paths crossed, and I can only hope to take what I learned from her and use it to continue the legacy she left behind. A legacy based on unconditional love for God and one another.

VILLAGE OF FOWLERVILLE NOTICE TO VILLAGE RESIDENTS GRASS AND WEED CONTROL

Weeds or brush in violation of section 86-29 must not be permitted to exist on property in the village and must be abated, cut, destroyed or removed by the person responsible for the property beginning May 1 and continuing throughout the month of May thru October of that year.

Sec. 86-29. Growth of certain weeds and brush prohibited.

Poisonous or injurious weeds.

Other weeds or grasses of any species or variety exceeding six inches in height.

Wild growing brush or underbrush exceeding six inches in height.

Failure to comply with section 86-29 will result in the village causing the abatement, cutting, destruction or removal of the weeds or brush in violation of section 86-29, and the cost thereof charged against the person responsible for the property. The village may abate, cut, destroy or remove the weeds or brush in violation of section 86-29 as many times as are necessary during the months of May thru October of the notice year and charge the cost to the person responsible for the property.



The Threats to Our Representative Democracy

With so much turmoil in Washington and around the country these days, it's easy to get caught up in the crises of the moment. These are, indeed, worth our attention — but so are longer-running developments that threaten the health of our representative democracy. I want to lay them out in one place, so that the most serious problems confronting our system don't slip from our attention.

First, it has become very hard to make our system work. Our country is so large, so complex — and, at the moment, so polarized and divided — that it's tough to make progress on the challenges that beset us.

In more ways than not, Congress reflects the country that elected its members; all the contrary sentiments and manifold cross-currents that characterize our communities come to rest on Capitol Hill. Ideally, that is where they should be reconciled — where discerning key facts, negotiating, and

consensus-building lead to a common way forward. Congress has failed us repeatedly in this regard, but we need at least to recognize the magnitude of its challenge.

Still, this does not excuse what I consider to be Congress's chief failing: in the face of difficult problems, it has become timid. Its members don't like to make hard choices. So they don't come close to living up to their responsibility to be a co-equal branch with the presidency.


They may criticize the President, but they also defer to him to set the agenda and to make policy. From national security and foreign affairs to the nation's mounting debt to entitlement reform to the long-term economic dislocation that has led so many Americans to feel forgotten, Congress has had little impact.

Which is why it's not surprising that we face a third longterm crisis: people have lost confidence in the institutions of government. This has been building for at least two generations, from the war in Vietnam and the turmoil it engendered back home, through Watergate, Iran-Contra, the war in Iraq, Hurricane Katrina, and the inability of Congress and presidents of both parties to enact comprehensive budgets and significant domestic reforms.

Yet no matter how understandable this lack of trust might be, it is a serious problem for our government and for the democratic system it embodies. Restoring public confidence will take hard, sustained work, starting with high standards of conduct at all levels. Once public confidence is lost, it can't be regained through rhetoric, only through exemplary performance.

But this won't happen unless we address the fourth

challenge: our elections system needs thorough reform. At pretty much every level, it's throwing democracy off-kilter. House districts have been gerrymandered to create so many safe seats that many members need only be responsive to their base. Our voting system is fragile and in disrepair, with its patchwork of procedures, obsolete machinery, and legislative attempts to limit access to the franchise in the name of "ballot

We need to ensure the fairness, integrity and efficiency of our voting infrastructure and procedures — or risk undermining one of the cornerstones of our democracy.

Which is also threatened by our fifth challenge: the powerful and pervasive influence of money on the political process. Our system is awash in money, which is spent to influence elections and gain favorable results. Many Americans feel money is what really runs Washington — as opposed to the ideas and principles we were taught in civics class.

Despite efforts at reform, the money problem is worse than ever — too many Americans feel they've become an afterthought in the political process.

Yet if they have, it's not just money that's to blame. My final concern is that too many of us have become disengaged from and indifferent to the political process. That may be changing at this particular moment, but as a historical trend, it's unarguable. As citizens, we have to learn how to solve problems in a representative democracy. We have to learn to work with people who hold different views, forge common ground with them, and hold our representatives to account not alone for their political views, but for their ability to get

To make representative democracy work, we, as citizens, have to up our game, too.

Michigan's Frogs & Toads

There are more than 3400 species of frogs and toads worldwide, with the majority living in the humid tropics. Michigan can boast only 13 species, but they are an important part of the State's wildlife heritage.

Frogs vs. Toads

How can you tell a frog from a toad? It's been said that a toad is just a lumpy frog! Toads do have thicker, more warty skins compared to the smoother skin of most frogs. Toads are adapted for drier conditions than frogs, though they spend much of their time burrowed into moist soil during times when the air is drier. Toads have shorter hind legs than frogs, comparatively speaking, and move in short hops or simply walk instead of making long leaps.

Michigan has two species of "true" toads, the American Toad and Fowler's Toad. Some species are hard to fit into either category. For example, Cricket Frogs have a warty skin, and the Gray Tree Frog (often called a "tree toad") spends much of the summer high in the trees away from water.

Bug Zappers!

From a human standpoint, frogs and toads are extremely beneficial animals. Their springtime choruses are a pleasure to hear, and most people enjoy seeing them, whether in wetlands or suburban gardens. Adult frogs and toads feed largely on insects, and destroy vast numbers of insect pests every year. It has been estimated, for example, that a single Cricket Frog an increasingly rare species in Michigan can consume about 4800 insects in one year. A hundred frogs would thus eat about 480,000 insects, a thousand frogs perhaps 4.8 million insects, and so on. It is clear that the loss of these tiny frogs in a wetland ecosystem would be no small matter! Larger frogs would eat even greater quantities, and the benefits of a backyard toad population are known to many

The Bull Frog is the only species that might eat creatures favored by people, such as fish, young ducks, or other frogs. But their impact is very minor. The Bull Frog is valued as a game animal itself as the source of "frog legs" used for human food. To help prevent overharvest of local frog populations, Michigan protects all frogs during the spring breeding season. Frogs can be legally harvested only during the "frog season" which opens the Saturday before Memorial Day and closes November 15.

This past week I attended a seminar sponsored by the Michigan Association of Counties. To network with fellow commissioners across our great state is very valuable. It is important to keep abreast with changes in laws and to gain insights concerning "best practices" here and across the country. I was able to establish contacts with other people who have ideas that may help improve internet access to our area.

In other recent items of interest, Joan Runyan, elections coordinator/deputy clerk, will be retiring in September after a very distinguished tenure at the county. We will be pre-filling this position because of all of the special knowledge she will need to teach her replacement. A new voting system will also be purchased soon requiring new training for all Livingston County elections officials.

Hawk Hollow Farms LLC will be constructing a new hanger to lease at the Livingston County airport. They are acquiring a larger aircraft that cannot now be housed locally.

Wednesday, April 19th, has been designated as Tornado Drill Day. Fifteen of the more than 1000 annual tornados happen in Michigan. This February, Cass County, Michigan, reported three tornadoes on the same day.

The GIS Division provides specialized maps and data extracts for our county. Since their rates have not been adjusted for over 10 years, they have been changed to encourage more usage and to be in line with other counties.

The new medical marijuana law brings changes that need to be understood and that require a new level of enforcement. The county is applying for a grant for our Sheriff's department to help educate the public and to learn what enforcement changes are needed locally for the new production and delivery provisions of the updated medical marijuana law.

911-Central Dispatch has been reorganized to separate it from the EMS department. In 2014, these two entities were merged when the former 911 director resigned and EMS Director, Jeff Boyd, was chosen to mentor the newly appointed deputy 911 director. Since that point, Chad Chewning has proven himself as a visionary leader for our 911 Dispatch and now has been raised to the newly-created position of director of 911.


