#### **Small-Town Crimes in the 1800's**

Have you ever been curious about what kinds of weird crimes have been committed in the past? Or what kinds of crimes people committed in small towns back in the 1800's? Well, I took a look into the June 20, 1890 issue of *The Fowlerville Review* and found that some people, especially out-of-towners, have been the cause of some rather peculiar incidents.

The first reported incident from that week's paper was of a man who worked as a brakeman on the railroad. He stopped in town for a drink and stole an umbrella. He was arrested and would have to pay \$10 or spend 15 days in the county jail. He didn't have the money so off to jail he went. The newspaper poked a bit of fun at the humor of this crime, a man going to jail for stealing an umbrella sounded just as funny back then as it does today!

The second incident reported in the week's paper was about a man who walked into someone's home while they were away. He stole some money and unexpectedly ran into a maid. The article recounts that the unidentified thief asked the maid to prepare him some food, but she was not taking his nonsense and told him to get out of the house, whereupon he "bowed politely and walked out the front door and disappeared."

The third and final crime reported in that week's paper was more of a warning against a scam that had been going on for some time. The scam was that an out-of-town salesman would come to a farmer and offer to let him try out a new plowshare for free. Then after he has tried it and decided whether he likes it, the farmer can simply pay the factory for it, or if he is unsatisfied, need not pay at all. However, the salesman finishes off the deal by having the farmer sign a paper, which is supposedly the agreement they've just made. But a few days later, it turns out that the paper is actually \$250 note that the salesman has taken for himself. The article finished off with a moral: "Deal with your own merchants and be shy of all who want to give you something for nothing."

This has been a peek into small-town crimes in the 1800's, the silly and the serious. If you want to read about more goings-on's from the past, stop by the Fowlerville District Library to check out our Digital Archive of *The Fowlerville Review* for yourself, available on all of our public computers.

## Michigan Senate Report

#### **Appealing Your Property Tax Assessment**

President Trump and Congress passed a historic tax cut for American families last year. And more recently, your state legislators voted to increase our state income tax personal exemption by \$600 over three years (Senate Bill 748).

Your Republican leadership will continue to fight for lower taxes and greater financial freedom, but you might be able to take control of your own taxes as well. Do you think your property tax assessment is incorrect? If so, you may be able to appeal it to your local Board of Review and, if necessary, to the Michigan Tax Tribunal.

No attorney is necessary for this process and appeal hearings will begin in March. Be sure to go to your local assessor's office and get a copy of your property records before then.

Property taxes are calculated using the "taxable value" standard. This number is not supposed to go up by more than inflation each year. If it increased more than 2.1 percent above your 2017 taxable value and you didn't do any renovations, you may have an opportunity to appeal.

Furthermore, if you're not satisfied with the judgment of the board of review, you may be able to appeal the decision to the Michigan Tax Tribunal.

To appeal an assessment to the Michigan Tax Tribunal, there are some deadlines: an appeal must be filed on or before July 31 for residential or agricultural property, and by May 31 for other property. An appeal must be filed within 35 days after the assessor, county treasurer, or county equalization director denies a claim for exemption.



then feel strong and alive. Third - we all need a "purpose" in our life and a "tribe" to share it with


What prompted me was this recent email:

when Michigan student achievement is nationally ranked in the bottom third of the country.

#### **Brewer announces candidacy for Livingston County Circuit Court seat**

Dennis Brewer, the former president of the Livingston County Bar Association, has announced his candidacy for an open seat on the 44th Circuit Court in Livingston County.

The seat is currently held by Livingston County 53rd District Court Judge Carol Sue Reader, who is prohibited from running again due to age restrictions. Following the 2018 election, the judicial seat will move from the 53<sup>rd</sup> District Court to the 44th Circuit Court.

Brewer, in his announcement, said that he was the first candidate to announce his candidacy for the seat, and stated that many of the county's top elected officials "are lining up behind him." Brewer noted that he has already earned the endorsement of both of Livingston County's state representatives, Rep. Lana Theis of Brighton Township and Rep. Hank Vaupel of Handy Township.

In addition to Theis and Vaupel, Brewer's list of early endorsements also includes Livingston County Sheriff Mike Murphy; Livingston County Commissioner and former Sheriff Bob Bezotte; Livingston County Register of Deeds Brandon Denby; and Livingston County Undersheriff Jeff Warder.

He currently serves as the President of the Hartland Area Youth Athletic Association (HAYAA), and serves on the school board at Light of the World Academy in Pinckney.

He coaches his sons in basketball, baseball and flag football. The Brewer family attends Venture Church in Hartland.

## Livingston County Comments

I would like to take a moment to step back from recent events that rock our thinking back to square one. Why is this happening and what part does government have in finding solutions?

I believe in limited constitutional government and that only a nation of good people can sustain liberty from generation to generation. A country of thieves cannot expect to walk safely on their own streets. How can our daughters be safe in public if we are not honorable in our actions to all women?

In my lifetime there has been a concerted effort to eliminate God and religion from public life and comment. We have, in many ways, had a successful coexistence of those who believe in God and those who do not. I'm afraid that the ascendance of the secular "god is irrelevant" attitudes have opened the door to many unexpected evils.

We have redefined time-honored phrases like separation of church and state and made them shackles on religion. Our public schools must teach sex education but cannot teach the moral reasoning needed to guide such a powerful force in society. If God is eliminated, the default position is that you have the right to make your own value system. Dr. Nassar made his own value system, but he was wrong. How are our young people to find the right values if such an educated man could not come up with an acceptable way?

When we look at all of these recent sex scandals and the public opinion expressed concerning them, we come back to some pretty old fashioned standards like "Thou Shalt Not Commit Adultery." Somehow the words "Sex between consenting adults" doesn't seem to fit so well. If you want to make anything of your life, the standards of interaction between men and women espoused by the late Billy Graham and our Vice President Pence suddenly make more sense.

Our founding document, The Declaration of Independence, openly declares all men are <u>created</u> equal and endowed by the <u>Creator</u> with certain unalienable rights. These universal ideals were taken forward and placed in documents called the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

Our form of government is not a democracy where a 51% majority can force its opinion on the 49%. Our government historically has been what is called a republic and is based on the universal reality of human nature and natural law. These truths do not change with the fashion of the day.

The Constitution was set up so that to move forward and make structural changes, broad support of 2/3 majority would be needed. Many different power structures were made so that to make the whole system work, a broad-based agreement would be needed. Our constitution was meant to keep government (which is the biggest threat to liberty) in

About 100 years ago, the "progressive" movement worked to put the power into fewer hands and to centralize the power of government so that the new ideas could be implemented by the "smart" social planners coming out of higher institutions of learning. This long, slow process has given us the monstrous federal government. That power is so great, it can hardly be resisted. This government has grown every time there is a national problem that "only government solve." Every evil rightfully calls for the intervention of government. Every theft, murder, rape, sexual abuse, etc. must be exposed by the police, adjudicated in the courts, and punished in jail or

The only answer to big government is revival of

good people. Before our revolution, our country experienced a Christian revival where people turned from their sin to God, and the movement of that time was the cradle that birthed a new nation based on universal principles. Being universal, they will work in any place, at any time where there are enough good people to have God's blessing.

Today the power of the government is less and less in the hands of the elected officials and more and more in the bureaucracy and the policies written by well-paid, unelected officials who remain nameless and are protected by laws making it almost impossible to fire a government employee.

What does this have to do with Livingston County and its commissioners? The oversight of government must start at the local level. Local government is the guardian of liberty. We must keep the growth of government in check by keeping taxes low. We must do what will encourage people to do good and to live productive, independent lives. We must allow for the revival of the same Christianity that has been the best impetus for liberty in the history of our country.



## Michigan House Report

By Dr. Hank Vaupel, 47<sup>nd</sup> District

It's no secret our roads are in poor condition here in Michigan, and drivers who fund those roads deserve better. This winter took an especially harsh toll on our roads in Livingston County and they are sure to get worse. We have funding available to put toward roads and now is the time to make it a priority, before any more vehicles are damaged by potholes.

I was pleased to support the Michigan House in the passage of the roads supplemental plan on Wednesday, which provides \$175 million in additional road repair funding to be used as early as this summer.

The road funding plan from two years ago will bring in more money for road repairs in the budget year that begins in October. This proposal we passed Wednesday is in addition to all of that.

In addition to state projects, this bill includes money for county, city and village roads throughout the state. Estimated local allocations include Livingston County (\$1,505,074), Fowlerville (\$22,533), Howell (\$62,188), Webberville

(\$9,984) and Fenton (\$83,573).

The money is left over from a previous state government budget cycle and is already available, meaning no budget cuts or additional fees or taxes are required for the investment. The money included in the bill approved this week comes in addition to previous changes providing more funding for road and bridge projects across the state.

House Bill 4321 advances to the Senate for further consideration.

This week I had the opportunity to attend the Hartland School Board meeting where I was able to present a tribute to recognize school board members for their very hard work for the community. While I was there I was also able to





#### **Cleansing Power of God's Word**

How can a young man cleanse his way? By taking heed according to Your word. (Psalm 119:9 NKJV).

The Word of God not only has the power to convict and correct us, it has the power to cleanse us. If we are to follow Christ Jesus and live godly and holy lives, we must undergo a thorough cleansing of the heart and mind. We must totally surrender every area of our lives to the control of the Holy Spirit. This is not easy because we live in a world where words like surrender, humility, humbleness and obedience are not

high on most people's priority list. However, it says in 1 John 1:9 NIV ...if we confess our sins to him, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all wickedness. Cleanliness of heart and mind is essential for all who profess to be Jesus' followers.

The Word of God has the power to cleanse us and transform us into the person that Jesus desires us to be. But before the Word of God can do anything in us and through us, it has to become a part of us. Let me explain. The Bible says in John 1:1, In the beginning the Word already existed. The Word was with God, and the Word was God. If the Word was God, and Jesus is God in the flesh, then it stands to reason that Jesus is the Word of God sent here to enlighten us and to teach us and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ... if we are living in the light, as God is in the light, then we have fellowship with each other, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, cleanses us from all sin (1 John 1:7NLT).

In the gospel of John, chapter fifteen, it gives a good illustration of how we are to be connected to God and how the Word of God cleanses us. In verses one to three we read, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts away every branch of mine that doesn't produce fruit. But he

trims clean every branch that does produce fruit, so that it will produce even more fruit. You are already clean because of the Word I have spoken to you."

When I read the Word of God, it is as if God were speaking to me from the pages. When I am down, it lifts me up and gives me hope. When I need wisdom, I find it in the pages of scripture. When I need direction, the Word points me to the right path. It convicts me when I do wrong. It corrects me when I am in error. And it cleanses me of all unrighteous thoughts and feelings when my human nature tries to take over.

The Bible says, Blessed is the one who does not walk in step with the wicked or stand in the way that sinners take or sit in the company of mockers, but whose delight is in the law of the Lord, and who meditates on his law day and night (Psalm 1:1-2 NIV).

When my thoughts get out of sync with the will of God, the Scripture can bring me back on course. When I spend my time meditating on God's Word, it re-establishes my total thought process and gives me a new perspective, a Godly perspective.

There are times when fear will try to creep back into my life and cause me to ignore opportunities that God puts in my path, to encourage another brother or sister who may be stumbling in their faith. But it tells me in Joshua 1:8 that I need to keep God's Word always on my lips; meditate on it day and night, so that I may be careful to do everything written in it. When I meditate on God's Word, there is no place for fear to enter my thoughts; therefore, the Word cleanses me of my fear. There are other times when I can become critical of others and I find myself saying things I should not be saying. God's Word helps me to stop and change my thoughts. It tells us in James 1:22 that we shouldn't *just listen to God's word. You must do what it says. Otherwise, you are only fooling yourselves.* 

There is great power in the Word of God (Proverbs 30:5). When we study and accept God's Word, we draw closer to the one who gives us access to the supernatural cleansing power of his word. Hebrews 4:12-13 reads: For the word of God is living and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the division of soul and spirit, and of joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. And there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are naked and open to the eyes of Him to whom we must give account.

God's word was given to us so that we might read and learn exactly what God requires of his people. Everything we need to live holy and godly lives can be found in the pages of scripture.

The scripture above tells us that there is power in God's Word. Power that is able to free us from seeking after the desires of our fleshly nature and to guide us toward the path of righteousness. A power that cleanses our minds and our thoughts so that we dwell on the things that God desires and we avoid the things that threaten to take our focus off the one and only true God.

I have been studying the Word for several years and the blessings I have received from my time in the scriptures cannot be counted. God's word has given me a new outlook toward life and has enabled me to break free of the chains of sin that kept me bound in misery for so many years. Today, my thoughts are, for the most part, focused on Christ and his saving grace.

I don't have to fear what may happen tomorrow or the next day, because God's word has cleansed me of all my fear.

The day of accountability is coming—at Christ's return with power and authority—when all people, as well as Satan and all his demons, will be forced to submit to the Word of God (Revelation 19:11-16).

#### **Reaching Retirement Age?** Here's What You Need to Know

Every birthday deserves celebration, but some seem a little more special than others do. Think of a baby's first birthday. Sweet 16. The "Big 4-0." Then, before you know it, along comes 65, a milestone especially important to retirees.

For nearly half a century, American workers looked to 65 as the age at which they could stop working and finally reap their full retirement benefits under the Social Security Act of

Today, however, the full retirement age is increasing based on your year of birth. In 1983, Congress changed the law to increase the retirement age over a 22-year period, citing improvements in the health of older people and increases in average life expectancy. To find out your full retirement age, visit www.socialsecurity.gov/planners/retire/ageincrease. html.

Of course, if you're insured for retirement benefits, you still can claim them as early as age 62 but your monthly payments are permanently reduced for each month that you file prior to your full retirement age.

For help in deciding which age is right for you to start receiving Social Security retirement benefits, read "When to Start Receiving Retirement Benefits" at www.socialsecurity. gov/pubs/EN-05-10147.pdf.

We have also made applying for benefits easier than ever. You can do it online! To apply for benefits, please go to www. socialsecurity.gov/applyforbenefits.

That said, age 65 should still factor in prominently as you prepare for retirement and a stable financial future because that's when most American workers first become eligible for Medicare health insurance coverage.

To see if you've earned enough credits through work to qualify for Medicare at age 65, view your Social Security Statement online using your personal my Social Security account. Create or log on to your account at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

If you're already receiving Social Security benefits before age 65, we'll automatically enroll you in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance) and Medicare Part B (supplemental medical insurance) effective the first day of the month you turn 65. Watch your mailbox a few months before your birthday for your Medicare card. Otherwise, three months before your 65th birthday, you can apply for Medicare Parts A and B online at www.socialsecurity.gov/applyforbenefits.

Your Initial Enrollment Period for Medicare starts three months before your 65th birthday month and continues for three months after. To learn more about Medicare enrollment and coverage, please visit www.socialsecurity.gov/medicare. To learn more about Medicare coverage, visit www.medicare.gov.
