Hudson Mills Old Power Club holding Antique Tractor Show on June 1-2-3

The Hudson Mills Old Power Club is holding its 27th Annual Antique Tractor Show this Friday, Saturday, and Sunday (June 1-2-3) at the Fowlerville Fairgrounds.

The event offers a variety of activities that are designed to be family friendly and historically informative.

"This is our third year at Fowlerville," said Jason Verbison, president of the club. "Before coming here, the event was held at the Hudson Mills Metro Park in Dexter."

There will be three days of tractor pulls with modified tractors competing on Sunday. "We range from 50 to 150 tractors showing up," said Verbison.

New this year is a Garden Tractor Pull, put on by the Webberville FFA Alumni and scheduled for Sunday.

Gas engines, many of them dating to the early 20th Century, will also be on display. "We'll have working demonstrations showing how this early farm equipment was used," he added. "We'll show how an engine, using a belt, was used to saw wood. There'll also be antique machines powering corn and feed grinders."

Garden Tractors and the Antique Tractors will also take part in several games, including 'Push a Barrel.' A Kids Pedal Pull, meanwhile, is planned for Saturday.

In addition, the event features a Flea Market and Swap



Meet, Arts & Crafts, a Bake Sale, Classic Cars & Trucks, a 50-50 Drawing, and an Oil Raffle sponsored by Corrigan Oil. Other highlights include a Kids Barrel Train that will provide rides to the younger attendees.

Food and refreshments will be available as well.

The show is open on Friday from noon to 8 p.m., Saturday from 8 a.m. to dusk, and Sunday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Entry to the event is \$5 per vehicle.

The club has around 65 members who reside in Livingston County and surrounding communities. Verbison is a second-generation member. "My father, John, is one of the founding members."

The club, he added, was started by Joe Chevalier who is still active



The Raiders added another four scores during the fifth and sixth frames, while Fowlerville put up a run in the sixth and two more in the seventh—coming up short.



The Essentials of a Christian Home Part 2

"Listen, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength. And you must commit yourselves wholeheartedly to these commands that I am giving you today. Repeat them again and again to your children. Talk about them when you are at home and when you are getting up. Tie them to your hands and wear them on your forehead as reminders. Write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates." (Deuteronomy 6:4-9).

The other night before going to sleep, I was watching the Gospel of John, video Bible. The last thing I remember before going to sleep was Jesus saying to the people: "You have eyes but you do not see. You have ears but you do not hear. You will die in your sins because you refuse to believe in the one God sent."

The second essential for making a Christian home is that we must respond to God's revelation of Himself. The only response that God will accept is a complete surrender of our hearts, mind and body to the one who has revealed Himself to us. This will take true love for the God of all creation.

"Where true love to God exists in the heart, it will manifest itself in a regard to His will, and in the diligent keeping of His commandments. Hence, His words were to be not only in the memory of the people, but laid upon their heart, that they might be ever present to the thought and will. They were also to be inculcated upon their children, and to be the subject of conversation on all fitting occasions between them, the members of their household, and even their casual associates. Thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children; literally, Thou shalt sharpen them to thy children, impress them upon them, send them into them like a sharp weapon" (Pulpit Commentary).

There are several passages of scripture in the Bible where God speaks about the unwillingness of His people to listen and adhere to His Word which was brought to them by prophet after prophet, and finally by Jesus Christ who

is, was, and always will be. Jeremiah 32:33 says: "They have turned their backs to me and not their face; though I taught them, teaching again

and again, they would not listen and receive instruction."

A hardened heart is a dangerous thing to have when it comes to accepting the truth of the scriptures, as Dr. Luke explains in the book of Acts. "For the hearts of these people are hardened, and their ears cannot hear, and they have closed their eyes so their eyes cannot see, and their ears cannot hear, and their hearts cannot understand, and they cannot turn to me and let me heal them" (Acts 28:27).

In the days when Jesus and His Disciples were preaching the gospel, their message was not gladly received by everyone. Only the people who were earnestly and honestly seeking God were able to hear and respond to the message. It is the same today, as people strive to achieve and fulfill the desires of their heart, they fail to benefit from this important teaching in the book of Acts.

As I look at the state of our nation, which seems hell-bent on repeating the same destructive ways of the Israelites, I find myself repeating the words of Jeremiah. "To whom can I speak and give warning? Who will listen to me? Their ears are closed so they cannot hear. The word of the Lord is offensive to them; they find no pleasure in it" (Jeremiah 6:10).

Spending hours in the Word every day; teaching our children about Jesus for long periods of time is not going to win you the 'best parent of the year' award. But it might help your children to take seriously the importance of developing a personal and intimate relationship with Jesus.

Jesus revealed Himself to us and faithfully carried out every task that His Father gave Him to perform. On the cross you could hear Him as he looked toward heaven and cried out the words, "It is finished." Literally: "Father I have done all that you sent me here to do, now let me be glorified and returned to you from whence I came."

For our home to be truly a Christian home, we must accept that Jesus is who He claimed to be; and we must also live as though we believe it. Our lives must not be given to chasing after the pleasure and treasure of this world. Jesus says to us in Matthew 6:19-20, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal."

Everything we do that does not honor our Father in heaven can be said to be "storing treasures on earth."

Seeking the treasures of heaven is to live our lives so that everything we do reflects the spiritual values of Jesus.

As an exercise for this week, take a piece of paper and divide it into two columns. In the first column, list all of the things you do daily to please yourself. In the other column, list the things you do because of your love for Jesus. The longest column will reflect what is most important to you.

The third essential for a Christian home is to have the truth of God's Word governing the home. The parent must teach their children the truth of God's revelation. God's truths must govern the parent's habits and conduct, both privately and publicly. *Next week will be Part 3 of 3*.

The Real Heroes

War has always been a unique endeavor. The ways it affects people and the ways it has been conducted throughout history are interesting to consider. When we come upon Memorial Day and think back to those brave service men and women who gave their lives for our country, we tend to picture them through the lens of popular stereotypes. We imagine them as steadfast heroes and protectors of the homeland who gave their lives gloriously on the field of battle. Patriotic music comes to mind along with a vision of the fallen comrade courageously breathing the last breath in service to the nation.

But war isn't much like that at all. We think of these images because we want to glorify those who have given all for us, and understandably so. We owe a tremendous and, in many ways, unpayable debt to those who have given their all to protect our freedoms and ensure we can continue to live in the greatest nation on earth.

However, we become too enamored with the picture of heroism that we often miss the reality of heroism. What do I mean by this? Over this weekend, people across the nation will commemorate Memorial Day, and they will give honor to the concept of service men and women who have given their lives. But at the same time, those people cannot be bothered to thank a veteran or give a hug to a gold star family.

We have constructed in our societal mind's eye the perfect image of a veteran. I think this is done with noble intentions in that we see them as heroes so in turn want to lift them up in greater appreciation and respect. That's great. We should give respect and appreciation to those who have sacrificed so much in their service to our great nation. But this perceived, perfect image results in what I consider to be a horrible tragedy. There are many who are so accustomed to this glorified image that they are turned off and cannot stand to be around those who actually served. The people who indulge in platitudes about honoring the fallen are the same ones who complain about the awkwardness of local veterans. What hypocritical piousness!

War is a practical animal bent on survival. If you think back to the very beginning with the Continental Army, very few of the rank and file soldiers and sailors served with patriotic ideals of grandeur. Most were there just trying to get a paycheck during a time when mere survival was difficult. Throughout the military's history, many of those who served did not start out with pure and patriotic intentions. It was a practicality. Yet, many of them still gave their lives. It's not a perfect picture. It's not how we imagine it. But to me, it is far more beautiful.

Despite the failures and difficulties and varied intentions, this broad array of men and women came together for one purpose: service to their nation. They may have been there for different reasons, but when push-came-to-shove, were ready to stand with their brothers and sisters and ultimately give their lives if needed. They may not fit into the perfect stereotypical mold we have for them, but they are the real heroes. None of us are perfect, but despite imperfections, they rose above the rest. So, the next time vou see an old veteran who has a stammer in his speech or a mother who tears up at the mention of her son, look beyond the immediate. Look past the imperfections. Remember the real heroes.

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

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


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Kreeger third graders write editorials on 'why people should donate food'

Michigan House Report

This past week I introduced a bill bringing awareness to potential issues with fetal alcohol syndrome for expectant mothers. Because the U.S. Surgeon General warns there is no safe amount of alcohol to consume during pregnancy, this legislation requires that an establishment that sells or serves alcoholic beverages must post a sign with the following message: "Pregnancy and alcohol do not mix. Drinking alcoholic beverages, including wine, coolers, and beer, during pregnancy can cause birth defects."

Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) are estimated to occur at a rate of 1 out of every 100 live births. These disorders are entirely preventable if we increase knowledge about the effects of fetal alcohol exposure. Children are the most important resource in our state, and FASD pose a serious threat to the potential health of our future generations. It's up to us to do increase awareness for alcohol's harmful effect on pregnancy.

Last Monday, I was present at Voyager Elementary as the school received a \$500 grant from Delta Dental for its library. The scholarship was awarded as part of a March is Reading Month program in recognition of the great reading programs in Howell Public Schools. Congratulations to Voyager, and thanks to Delta Dental for investing in our schools.

I was honored to attend the public officials appreciation service at Victory Baptist Church in Hartland. It was an encouraging and heartfelt ceremony with a very welcoming atmosphere. Thank you to Pastor Ryan Guenther and the entire congregation for your prayers and support.
