#### Why I Love My Church

"We can make our plans, but the LORD determines our steps" (Proverbs 16:9).

One thing I have learned over my years of following Jesus is not to rely too much on my ability to plan my course into the future. There have been times when I thought I knew exactly what I was going to do with my life, only to have God move in and direct me to change directions, and follow Him in another direction. Because of this, I don't often plan ahead as to what I will be doing in the future. I simply wait for God to show me the way.

I forgot this when I was retiring from my position as the pastor of the United Methodist Church. In 2015, when I learned that I was going to have to retire whether I wanted to or not, I began to make plans as to where we were going to move. At the time we were living in the church parsonage which would have to be vacated when I retired. Gloria and I talked about it, and we were almost certain that we would be moving into Addison Farms Condominiums. A year earlier, a good friend of mine who lived there passed away and her children told me that they would sell her unit to me after they got it cleaned out.

As my retirement date grew nearer, I called the daughter of my friend to make sure they were still going to sell to me. She told me that she could not promise me that she would. Naturally, I panicked. In a couple of months we would be homeless if we didn't find a place soon. Since we thought we were not going to get the Condo, we began to make plans to move to a warmer climate. Gloria and I spent hours on the web looking for homes in the south and other places where the winters are less severe.

My heart was set on Arizona, but I finally realized that Gloria was not buying into that location. She does not like the heat the way I do. At first we were thinking about Tennessee. We even drove down to the Knoxville area to look at several homes we found on the internet. We were disappointed with all of them, either because of the location or the surrounding area. On the way home, we decided that maybe Tennessee was not far enough south. We decided that Mississippi was the place to go. We were already traveling to Jackson at least once a year to visit Gloria's relatives, and we both liked the area. This would mean that Gloria would be around her relatives in case something happened to me.

Shortly before our retirement was to be final, as we were browsing the internet looking for homes, we found a condominium in Brandon, Mississippi which was only about 10 minutes from Gloria's family. We drove down to look at it, and we made an offer—which the owner accepted. We began to make plans for moving and how we were going to work things out so we could be financially able to afford our new home.

Meanwhile, up in heaven, I can imagine God shaking His head saying: "This kid has not learned anything. He still thinks he is in control."

About a month before I was to retire, my plan started to unravel. The deal on the condominium fizzled, and we were right back where we started at ground zero.

Now, I share with you how God works. One of the members of my church approached us out of the blue and offered to allow us to stay in their home for as long as we needed. They had a special unit built for their parent who had passed on. We accepted their offer, but we still didn't know what God had in store for us.

Shortly after that the son of my friend who owned the condominium in Fowlerville called and asked if we were still interested in purchasing it. I told them we were. I contacted a realtor friend of mine who agreed to handle the sale. It looked like things were falling into place except for one slight problem. How were we going to afford it? God had an answer for that, too. I sold both of our vehicles and leased two new vehicles for less than I was paying for one of ours. This brought our finances in line; however, things were going to be tight. Again God moved into action.

I was running the sound and video for the graduation ceremony for the preschool at my church one night and Pastor Mark Wilson, the husband of my preschool Lead Teacher, approached me and asked if I would be willing to talk with him about something he had been praying about. It turns out that he needed someone to come alongside him and work in the area of Pastoral Care. I could hardly believe what I was hearing. I was being offered a position that would allow me to do the thing I loved the most in ministry, and get paid for

After talking with Gloria, we both realized it was an answer to our prayers and I accepted his offer.

When I stopped trying to plan my future and surrendered my will to His Will, things began to happen in my life that I could have never accomplished on my own. We got the home we wanted. We got to stay in the town close to the friends we have grown to love. I got to work in the two areas of ministry I care about the most, pastoral care and substance abuse counseling.

I was approached to write this column which has become a vehicle for sharing God's Word to far more people than I could ever imagine. Almost everywhere I go within a fifty mile radius of Fowlerville, someone will approach me and ask if I am Pastor Tom. This is because they are reading my column. Praise be to God!

Congressman Mike Bishop's environmental concern for the Great Lakes belies his past actions. He voted to weaken the Clean Air Act by supporting H.R. 806 that reduced ozone safety. #### **Embarrassments**

What embarrasses you? Have you ever had an embarrassing moment? I've met a few people in my time who claim they just don't care enough to be embarrassed over things and thus have never had an embarrassing moment. While I get the gist, I have my doubts about the total accuracy in that they have never been embarrassed. I think all of us have had to suffer through some awkward, embarrassing situation at some point in our lives. It's part of human nature. We have a certain idea of how social norms should be observed, and when it doesn't work out the way we expect, it can be embarrassing. What it is that causes this embarrassment can range widely from person to person since we see things differently and are affected by things differently.

While this variation in embarrassing moments is normal, there are certain things our society sees as embarrassing that I don't think should cause embarrassment for anyone. Last week, I mentioned that strong families should not cause us to feel ashamed. I had a conversation with a lady the other day who shared her regret that close families are hard to find anymore. Indeed, my generation especially feels the need to be aloof from family matters and live life "free and wild." They think being close to family is archaic and limiting. I don't think we should be embarrassed about being close to our families. This is not an indictment on families who are struggling or separated. Not in the slightest. Rather, we should be pulling together to support them and help pave a positive future for them so we can be strong together.

I also don't think we should be embarrassed by our faith. Under the guise of inclusion, culture has swung in the complete opposite direction to almost-universal exclusion. Just because I am strong in my faith does not mean I want to curse you for yours. Neither does it mean you should try to restrict my practice of faith. I would rather show of myself a love for Christ than try to hinder someone else's religious practices. That doesn't help my cause. And that same benefit should be afforded me. It's a two-way street. You can't have your cake and eat it, too. That's freedom of religion, and it means I have the right to not be embarrassed by my faith.

Additionally, and I'm sure you all saw it coming from the start, we do not need to be embarrassed by our country. You've heard me talk about this a lot, but the narrative needs to be told repeatedly so we don't forget. If we let it slip, then it's easy to become complacent about our view of America. We could start believing the counter-narrative that we for some reason should be embarrassed by our nation. I've said it before, and I can pretty much guarantee I'll say it many times again: America isn't perfect, and while we can and should acknowledge that, she is still the greatest country to ever exist. And I won't be persuaded otherwise. Fourth of July is right around the corner; let's be proud and thankful for the blessing of America again.







## Michigan DNR Fishing Tip-How to catch your own nightcrawlers

Are you interested in catching and keeping your own nightcrawlers? It's fairly easy to do so, just follow these simple steps.

- 1. Know where to look. Scout areas (such as parks, play-grounds, open grassy areas) after a good rain. Look for night-crawler castings (the little piles of dirt they leave behind) and then plan a visit following the next good rain.
- 2. Know when to collect. Nightcrawlers are best caught an hour or so after dark.
- 3. Bring the right equipment. Nightcrawlers are sensitive to vibrations so wear light-weight shoes. They're also sensitive to bright light so consider rigging your flashlight with a red cover over the lens.
- 4. Store them properly. Upon catching, just lay them on top of some storage bedding -- don't mix them in. This will allow you to remove sick or dead nightcrawlers more easily.



It's been a while since I penned an article for the Fowlerville News & Views ... 2007! Back then I was sharing news and information on exciting programs taking place at the library for the community to enjoy. Today ... well, today I write to reflect on someone very important to me, and I think very important to many of you. My aunt. Our retiring Library Director Cheryl Poch.

It is hard to fathom. My aunt has been at the helm of the Fowlerville District Library for 33 years. Part of your community for that many years. And what an amazing 33 years those have been. From serving when this was the Fowlerville Public Library, to helping with the structural

changes to become the Fowlerville District Library, to FINALLY finding a new home which opened just last week. She has been there. And not for herself, but for you ... to ensure the Fowlerville Library, as Arthur Ashe said "... became courts of last resort, as it were. The current definitive answer to almost any question can be found within the four walls of most libraries."

My aunt has worked hard to ensure that the Fowlerville community would have their library be a place where the answer to most questions could be found within its walls.

Perhaps this visual from Monty Python was more correct than I thought: "You see, I don't believe that libraries should be drab places where people sit in silence, and that's been the main reason for our policy of employing wild animals as librarians." Not to say my aunt is a wild animal, but to say we had fun at the Fowlerville Library. It was, is, and will continue to be a hub—and a fun hub of the community.

I am sure we all have fond memories of time spent at the library: to read, to connect, to enjoy a program, to get away ... through a book. I have countless memories that I will never forget, from interactions with patrons at the circulation desk, to summer reading programs, to Good News, Bad News stories, to singing, to helping Cheryl and Karin pick out the newest books to add to the collection for everyone to enjoy. So many memories.

What are your fondest memories of the Fowlerville Library? Do you remember when we would stamp the due

date for your books in the book and on a separate card? Do you remember the paper-based card catalog? What about the day we moved to an electronic card catalog and received library cards with those barcodes? I sure do (and still have my original library card, the second one issued!). I was there, helping staff, helping my aunt, change out the old for the new. To stay current. To stay relevant. What about those summer reading programs, or special programs? 

## Fowlerville Library has only had two fulltime directors since 1966

In October of 1985—the first year of the *Fowlerville News* & *Views*—I ran a front-page story on Hope Killinger, the director of the Fowlerville Public Library who was retiring after 19 years at that post.

A month later, the newspaper had a story on the new director, Cheryl Poch, who had begun her duties as Hope's replacement on Oct. 17. Cheryl had come to Fowlerville after ten years of working at the Brighton City Library.

This Saturday, June 30, will mark Cheryl's last official day as the director of what's now the Fowlerville District Library, retiring after nearly 33 years in this position. Replacing her will be Beth Lowe who has been with the local library for over ten years and has been the Program Coordinator since 2010.

When I interviewed Hope those many years ago, she recalled that when she started the library was located in the then Village of Fowlerville offices at the corner of South Grand Avenue and Power Street and only had enough room for 4,000-to-6,000 books, plus other materials. She added that the library also served as the Village Council and Handy Township Board meeting room, noting that the Village offices were in back and the fire department was next door.

She pointed out in the interview that, with her hiring in 1966, the library expanded its schedule of being open to 32 hours. Prior to that, she said, it was operated by a part-time staff.

So, doing the math, the local library has only had two fulltime directors since 1966—a span of over 51 years.

I remember going to that location as a high school student, checking out books to read as well as back issues of the news weeklies I used for my Social Studies reports. Students also had access to the school library, so between the two sources I had ample reading and research materials.

A milestone event during Hope's tenure was the construction of a new 2,000 square-foot building on Mill Street in 1970-71 for the purpose of serving as the community library. A wing was added shortly before Hope's departure, providing even more room.

"When we came over here we had 6,100 volumes and we now have 16,000 titles," she noted in that article. "Also, the first year I worked we had 6,000 check-outs and the year before last we had 25,000. So, you see, the larger we've become, the more we've been used by the public. We had a little bit of everything back in the old location; we just didn't have as much as we do now."

In my story introducing Cheryl as the new director, we learned that she had grown up in Detroit but that her family had moved to the Brighton area during her senior year. However, she explained, due to their home being just across the boundary, she graduated from Howell High School. She said that she started working at the Brighton City Library nights while going to college. She started out at Concordia College in Ann Arbor for a year-and-a-half, then went to Washtenaw Community College for a year-and-a-half, and finished up at Eastern Michigan University.

"After graduating in 1978 I worked half-time at the library and then a year later my job went into full time," she said in that article.

When I asked her how she became a librarian, Cheryl replied that she "always liked to read and enjoyed theater, speech, and drama."

She also played the guitar, did some singing, and used both of those talents to tell stories, lead sing-alongs, and otherwise entertain library patrons, particularly the youngsters. In fact, she suggested the photo that I planned to take to accompany the news story have her holding her guitar. That photo from 1985 is included with this article, along with the one I took of Hope.

The library has undergone a number of improvements and changes during Cheryl's tenure. The recent re-location to a new, larger facility on South Grand Avenue has to be at the top of the list. A new addition to the former site in 2009 was another landmark event. The transition to a District Library still another.

There has been the addition of computers, the impact of the internet, and the emergence of E-books as an alternative to print volumes. A variety of programs—both entertaining and educational—have been added to the offerings. Perhaps more importantly has been the continued growth in use by the



Hope Killinger passed away a number of years ago. Now Cheryl Poch is retiring. Time marches on, as they say. My wife, Dawn, and I join the rest of her many friends in wishing her the best in the coming years.

#### **Democratic commissioner candidates** urge using "idle" funds for road work

Livingston County is sitting on millions of dollars that could be put to work fixing the county's deteriorating roads without raising taxes, Democratic candidates for county commission said in a news release last Wednesday.

The six Democratic candidates are calling for the county to use at least \$10 million from the huge surplus sitting idle in its delinquent tax revolving fund to pay for road improvements throughout the county to begin fixing roads right now.

"Enough is enough. Our roads have been left to crumble while the county has just been sitting on money that could be used to fix them, make us safer on the road, and give people jobs. We have the money, but our county commission lacks the vision and the will to make road funding a priority. When elected in November, we will see to it that this money is put to work for our community," said Democratic candidate Kasey Helton of Marion Township.

The County's delinquent tax revolving fund had \$42.7 million in unrestricted funds as of Dec. 31, 2017, according to the latest financial report delivered to the county board. Investing \$10 million would still leave a large amount of available cash to make pension contributions and for emergencies without jeopardizing the county's financial

Michigan law gives responsibility for maintaining local roads to county government, but for too long the County Commission has kicked the can down to the townships. Many townships, including Hamburg, Green Oak, Hartland, and Howell, have had to ask their voters to approve millages to pay for road improvements. In other cases, property owners have had to form special assessment districts to tax themselves to fix the roads.

In the news release, the candidates stated that "it's not just the County Commissioners that refuse to act. Republicans in Lansing have offered only band-aid solutions for the multibillion-dollar problem of fixing Michigan's infrastructure."

"We have had years of failed Republican leadership on roads here in Livingston County. We can do better for our community, and we will," Helton said while announcing the plan on behalf of the Democratic candidates at an event last Tuesday night in Howell.

"While the commissioners have been bragging about having the State's lowest tax rate, they have overlooked the obvious solution of using idle county funds. Their lack of vision has left Livingston County with the worst roads in the seven-county region of southeast Michigan, according to the latest figures from the Transportation Asset Management Council data on the state website, Michgan.gov.," the candidates stated.

According to the news release, with 50.5 percent of county roads rated as being in "poor' condition, Livingston County is worse than Wayne (35.1 percent); Oakland (48.2 percent), Macomb (42.6 percent), Washtenaw (37.5 percent), Monroe (32.9 percent), and St. Clair (48 percent).

"The County's percentage of "poor" roads is nearly 10 points higher than the 42.3 percent for the region as a whole. And it's actually getting worse and worse. In 2008-09, the data showed 35.44 percent of Livingston County lane-miles as being in poor condition. In 2012-13. the percent poor had dropped slightly to 33.05. But in the last five years, it has shot up by more than 18 points to more than half (50.45 percent)," the group added.

The candidates they would work with the Livingston County Road Commission to devise a program of spending the money, with a portion reserved for the Road priorities Commission's and a portion used for a matching program with local governments, both townships and cities. The Road Commission's budget for this year is \$36.8 million.

Money in the delinquent tax revolving fund comes from interest and penalties for late property taxes. Other counties, such as Wayne, have used these funds to supplement their general fund. Recently, Macomb County officials proposed using its delinquent tax revolving fund for roads as


