Conway Board votes 3-2 against putting internet bond proposal on ballot

The Conway Board voted 3-2 against putting a bond proposal on the November General Election ballot that would have allowed the Township to sell bonds for the purpose of making high-speed internet available to residences throughout the township. Mike Rife, the supervisor, and Larry Parsons, a trustee, joined Rick Kreeger, a trustee, in opposing the resolution, the two of them reversing their earlier support.

Todd Anderson, the clerk, and Debbie Grubb, the treasurer, supported the motion.

The decision was made at last Tuesday's (May 15) regular meeting, with about 50 people in the audience. During the Call to the Public, several people spoke both for and against putting the request before voters.

The proposal was to borrow around \$5.7 million, the estimated cost for installing fiber optic lines to all areas of the township. The money would have been paid back over a 20year period with revenues collected from a special tax levy.

Initially, the estimate was that the annual payment needed to service this debt would require just over 2.5 mills in additional property taxes. That figure, however, was changed to over 3.5 mills.

The board and a room full of residents had heard a presentation on the project and what it would cost during a special meeting on April 10. At this session, the estimate of 2.517 mills was given. The board subsequently voted 4-1 to put the request to sell the bonds on the August Primary ballot. The lone dissenter was Kreeger.

However, at the regular board meeting held the following week (April 17), the board was informed by its bonding counselor that a more conservative figure would be 3.5395 mills. The attorney also pointed out that the proposal was to sell bonds to finance the project, not set a millage rate. He added that an exact levy would be determined after the bonds were sold.

This higher estimate caused Rife and Parsons, along with Kreeger, to support putting the proposal on the November General Election rather than the Primary ballot, with the board to consider this revised resolution at its May meeting.

This unexpected increase in the estimated millage rate, the possibility of additional costs that wouldn't be covered by the bond issue, and the adverse effect the extra taxes would have on farmers and other large landowners were reasons Larry Parsons cited for opposing the resolution.

"The change in the millage rate shocked me," said Parsons. "We had a full house at the (earlier) April 10th meeting and people left, thinking the amount would be around 2.5 mills. When we learned a week later that it more likely would be over 3.5 mills, I was very concerned that we (the board) had unintentionally misled people."

Parsons, who has been on the board for nearly 27 years, said his decision to oppose the resolution "is by far the most difficult one I've had."

"Between the April and May meetings, I did as much research as I could," he said. "Do you allow people to vote on this matter and express their desire, or take it away—which

is very serious?"

Parsons said the extra cost this tax levy would impose on farmers and its possible adverse effect on their livelihood caused him to choose the latter course.

"I felt the farmers needed protection," he said. "They would bear the largest share of this \$5.7 million cost, yet they no longer have sufficient numbers to exert a voice at the polls.

"In surveys that have been done, preserving open spaces and farm land is high on residents' list," Parsons pointed out. "That priority is reflected on our Master Plan. Placing this additional cost of operation on our farmers puts that goal at

He also cited an uncertainty on what the project might cost as another factor in his change-of-mind.

"The only township in Michigan to have approved a special tax levy for bringing high-speed internet to its residents is Lyndon Township in Washtenaw County," Parsons said. "It was approved by voters last August. I've talked with the supervisor there several times. He told me that after nine months, he still doesn't know how much it will cost. He told me that he's learned a lot of lessons during that time since passage, adding that everyone has cost the township money."

Parsons said that while he has confidence in what the township consultants have told the board concerning the installation costs, additional costs could occur, including needing extra help to administer a system after it became operational.

"Should we run short with the estimates or have other costs besides building the system, the money would have to come from the General Fund," he said. "The price, when all is said and done, could be high."

Kelly Lott, the Fowlerville Postmaster and a veteran, will emcee both services.

The Poppy Story

From the battlefields of World War I, weary soldiers brought home the memory of a barren landscape transformed by wild poppies, red as the blood that had soaked the soil. By that miracle of nature, the spirit of their lost comrades lived on.

The poppy became the symbol of the sacrifice of lives in war, and represented the hope that none had died in vain. The American Legion Auxiliary Poppy has continued to bloom for the casualties of four wars, its petals of paper bound together for veterans by veterans, reminding America each year of the men and women who have served and died for their country.

Poppy Day has become a familiar tradition in almost every American community. This distribution of the bright red memorial flower to the public is one of the oldest and most widely recognized programs of the American Legion Auxiliary.

This poppy, as a memorial flower to the war dead, can be traced to a single individual, Miss Moina Michael. She was so moved by Col. McCrae's poem that she wrote a response:

> ...the blood of heroes never dies But lends a luster to the red Of the flower that blooms above the dead In Flanders' Fields.

On impulse she bought a bouquet of poppies, all that New York City's Wanamaker's Department Store had, and handed them to businessmen meeting at the New York YMCA where she worked. That was November 1918. World War I was over, but America's sons would rest forever "in Flander's Fields". Later, she would spearhead a campaign that would result in the adoption of the poppy as the national symbol of sacrifice.

Red paper poppies will be available in the Fowlerville area on May 24, 25 and 26. Representatives of the American Legion Auxiliary, Orson A. Rose Post 215 will be in the community soliciting donations for the poppies. All monies collected go directly to veterans' activities. Fowlerville's paper poppies are made at the Veterans' Hospital in Grand Rapids. While the local ALA is an inactive unit, two major activities the post still participates in are "POPPY DAYS" in May and "THE CHRISTMAS SHOP", both activities are for veterans in the VA hospitals.

On Being Great

I think it's fair to say that most people want to be great. We want to feel like we have an impact on history, and we want to be recognized for our contributions. However, there is unfortunately a widespread misconception on what greatness looks like. We are used to seeing the movies or reading books where the hero charges forth to victory while handily overcoming all challenges before being celebrated and cheered by thronging crowds. We see this template so often that we start believing that is how it's actually supposed to work. If we do not have some epic trial to overcome or have an enamored fan base, then we feel left out and think we must not be achieving greatness.

Rather than this cliched rubric for greatness, I believe there are three things that are needed to be truly great. First, there has to be hard work. Sure, the heroes on TV are put through difficult challenges and struggles, but the opportunity to show greatness is usually just handed to them with very little

effort on their part beforehand. After all, they have to fit all that greatness into just a one-hour block! In the real world, achieving greatness is not something that typically happens overnight. In modern terminology, we have to 'grind.' It's about doing the hard thing even when everyone else has gone home and we have to finish the job alone.

Closely tied to hard work is

the need for patience and commitment. Back to that idea of 'grinding.' Hard work only goes so far if you only do it once! I have worked with several people over the years who would complete one major project and suddenly believe they are qualified to be the boss. Yeah, it's great they got that job done, but there are many more tasks to do. When you are always the one doing the majority of the work while everyone else goofs off, it can quickly get discouraging. That is why you have to determine to be committed before you ever get started. Make that promise to yourself, and then stick with it. We have been taught through popular media that greatness is determined through public recognition and respect. People have little self-esteem since they are constantly waiting for someone else to praise them. However, greatness does not require outside recognition. In fact, some of the greatest people out there never receive the respect they deserve. They are simply satisfied to patiently work hard and do the best they can do regardless of external praise or condemnation. They can encourage themselves and take personal satisfaction in the job they are accomplishing. It can be a difficult pill to swallow since we are accustomed to seeing the opposite, but greatness can be found through humble, committed hard work.

Three Essentials for a Christian Home Part One

"Listen, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength. And you must commit yourselves wholeheartedly to these commands that I am giving you today. Repeat them again and again to your children. Talk about them when you are at home and when you are on the road, when you are going to bed and when you are getting up. Tie them to your hands and wear them on your forehead as reminders. Write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates" (Deuteronomy 6:4-9).

Some may think the words above don't apply to us today. I hear so many people make the statement that the things in the Old Testament are not relevant any longer; that times have changed. Times have changed, and we as people have changed, but God has not changed and neither has his Holy Word.

I am constantly amazed by the fact that the Bible, written so long ago, is still relevant today. In Matthew 24:3, Jesus tells us, "Heaven and earth will pass away but My words shall not pass away." Again in Isaiah 40:8, God assures us, "The grass withers, the flower fades, but the Word of God stands forever." The Bible has stood the test of time. The words of wisdom found in Scriptures of old, still hold true today.

History has also proven God's Word to be true. The truths and principles therein are as applicable to our lives as they were to the lives of Abraham, David and the Apostle Paul.

So when I read Deuteronomy 6:4-9 and I hear Moses telling the Israelites that "The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength. And you must commit yourselves wholeheartedly to these commands that I am giving you today." I take those words seriously.

As a Christian, it is my responsibility to know and to apply God's Word to my daily walk through life. Loving God with all my heart, soul and strength is as relevant to me today as it was to the Israelites when Moses was leading them.

But as time elapses, God and His Word, is losing its place of prominence in the hearts of those who profess the name of Christian. If we're honest, we will admit that our fear and reverence for God has dwindled down to little more than an acquaintanceship. We are not as passionate about our relationship with God as we are in other relationships we have with mere mortals. We are not teaching our children and young people, as the scriptures instruct us in verse seven of our text.

We do not spend the time with our children that is necessary to help them develop a good and healthy relationship with

What You Need to Know About Reverse Mortgages

Dear Savvy Senior,

What can you tell me about reverse mortgages for retirees? My wife and I are contemplating getting one but want to make sure we know what we're getting into.

Running Short

Dear Running,

For retirees who own their home and want to stay living there, but could use some extra cash, a reverse mortgage is a viable financial tool, but there's a lot to know and consider to be sure it's a good option for you.

Let's start with the basics.

A reverse mortgage is a unique type of loan that allows older homeowners to borrow money against the equity in their house (or condo) that doesn't have to be repaid until the homeowner dies, sells the house or moves out for at least 12 months. At that point, you or your heirs will have to pay back the loan plus accrued interest and fees, but you will never owe more than the value of your home.

It's also important to understand that with a reverse mortgage, you, not the bank, own the house, so you're still required to pay your property taxes and homeowners insurance. Not paying them can result in foreclosure.

To be eligible, you must be 62 years of age or older, own your own home (or owe only a small balance) and currently be living there.

You will also need to undergo a financial assessment to determine whether you can afford to continue paying your property taxes and insurance. Depending on your financial situation, you may be required to put part of your loan into an escrow account to pay future bills. If the financial assessment finds that you cannot pay your insurance and taxes and have enough cash left to live on, you'll be denied.

Loan Details

Around 95 percent of all reverse mortgages offered today are Home Equity Conversion Mortgages (HECM), which are FHA insured and offered through private mortgage lenders and banks. HECM's also have home value limits that vary by county, but cannot exceed \$679,650.

How much you can actually get through a reverse mortgage depends on your age (the older you are the more you can get), your home's value and the prevailing interest rates. Generally, most people can borrow somewhere between 50 and 65 percent of the home's value. To estimate how much you can borrow, use the reverse mortgage calculator at *ReverseMortgage.org*.

You also need to know that reverse mortgages have recently become more expensive with a number of fees, including: a 2 percent lender origination fee for the first \$200,000 of the home's value and 1 percent of the remaining value, with a cap of \$6,000; an upfront 2 percent mortgage insurance premium (MIP) fee on the maximum loan amount, plus an annual MIP fee that's equal to 0.5 percent of the outstanding loan balance; along with an appraisal fee, closing costs and other miscellaneous expenses. Most fees can be deducted for the loan amount to reduce your out-of-pocket cost at closing.

To receive your money, you can opt for a lump sum, a line of credit, regular monthly checks or a combination of these.

Summer gas rules return to Southeast Michigan counties, starting June 1

Ozone monitoring will return to eight counties in Southeast Michigan as extra measures are implemented to lower smog levels in the area. Effective Friday, June 1, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw, and Wayne counties must only sell or dispense gas that does not exceed 7.0 pounds per square inch vapor pressure.

The summer gasoline program was introduced in 1996, due to monitored violations of the National Ambient Air Quality for ozone, as outlined in the EPA's Clean Air Act, in the Detroit area. Enforcing the low-RVP requirement by MDARD ensures Michigan continues to receive federal highway funding dollars.

"Summer formula gasoline increases fuel efficiency and helps smog-causing compounds from being released into the atmosphere," said Craig VanBuren, Laboratory Division Director, Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development. "MDARD inspectors will be conducting on-site testing during the summer gas season, which runs from June 1 to September 15."

MDARD, as part of its duties under Michigan's Motor Fuel Quality Act, Public Act 44 of 1984, is charged with enforcing ozone protection measures in addition to assuring the quality of the gasoline being dispensed in the state.

Anyone who suspects problems at the pump is encouraged to call MDARD's 24-hour hotline for reporting complaints, 1-800-MDA-FUEL (1-800-632-3835).

Also note that because reverse mortgages are complex loans, all borrowers are required to get face-to-face or telephone counseling through a HUD approved independent counseling agency before taking one out. Most agencies typically charge around \$125. To locate one near you, visit *Go.usa.gov/v2H*, or call 800-569-4287.

Government is not a replacement for individual effort

Some Americans have been misled into believing that government can be a solution to all sorts of everyday problems: Need extra cash for bills or services? Government can provide it. Overhear some speech that you found in poor taste? Government can stop it. Upset at the price of a certain good or service? Government can fix it. These are radically misguided views that jeopardize our individual freedoms and destabilize the legitimate roles of government.

The Constitution of the United States of America outlined the few, modest duties of the federal government, and none of the above are listed among them. The assumption was that these needs and any others that may arise would be met by private enterprise, state or local governments, the faith community, or voluntary groups of individuals.

When we as citizens neglect our civic duties and instead demand that government step in, we relinquish our freedom for the sake of convenience and we invariably limit our other options once we've discovered that government is not a good champion of our desires.

There are countless examples of how government dependence actually harms the recipients instead of lifting them up. Worse still, private charity dries up when potential do-gooders assume that government can and will handle all private suffering. With sky-high taxes to pay for growing entitlements, the individual, too, has fewer resources to help on his own accord, and a spiral of government dependence occurs.

When we allow government into more arenas of our lives for support, we open ourselves up to ever more coercive or predatory governance. Suddenly that government health plan is dictating what kind of medical care you receive, and those government food stamps are prohibiting your children's favorite foods.

It's our duty as free people in a republic to protect our liberties for ourselves and for posterity — not to lazily outsource our problems to government.

Famed economist and thinker F.A. Hayek put it well when he said: "By giving the government unlimited powers, the most arbitrary rule can be made legal; and in this way a democracy may set up the most complete despotism imaginable."





Library Board & Village Council reach agreement on former library

The Fowlerville District Library Board and its staff are busy moving into the new, larger facility on South Grand Avenue, with the re-opening scheduled for Friday, June 15. Meanwhile, there's the task of selling the previous library building on Mill Street, next to the Fire Hall.

To accomplish this, the Library Board and the Fowlerville Village Council needed to reach an agreement on the Village selling the land where the old library is located.

What caused this situation is that, prior to the formation of a District Library, the Library was an entity of the Village of Fowlerville and administered by an elected Village Library Board. When the decision was made in the 1960s to build a library on Mill Street, it was erected on Village-owned land.

The agreement reached by the two local government bodies is that once the building is sold, the Library Board will pay the Village \$52,500. Marion Cornett, president of the Library Board, explained that the figure is based on \$4-a-square-foot multiplied by the size of the building.

"The Fowlerville District Fire Board recently purchased the site where the fire hall is located from the Village for that square footage price, so we felt it was a good figure to use," she said

Cornett said that the Fire Board is not interested in purchasing the building, so it will be appraised and then offered for sale.





They don't make things like they used to

How many times have you heard this statement (They don't make things like they used to) from people of a certain age. I heard those words of wisdom from older people as I grew up.

Now that I have some age on me, I hear these same words of wisdom from folks my age telling younger people, "They don't make things like they used to." I'm sure many things fall under this statement, but I hear it mostly referring to the quality and dependability of cars and trucks made decades

I, for one, am glad that cars are not made like they used to be. Don't get me wrong, I really like old cars. They have been my hobby since I was old enough to say "car go by, by." I have a 1960 Chevy Impala that I restored and drive as much as I can. I have owned this car for 33 years and have owned many other vehicles over the years that, in retrospect, I should have kept. But dumb me, I sold them.

In 1960 the recommended engine oil change was for every 2,000 to 4,000 miles and lubricating chassis every 2000 miles, while changing ignition points and spark plugs was 5,000 miles and replacing paper element air cleaner should be done every 15,000 miles. This is only a few of the maintenance guidelines in the 1960 Chevrolet Owners Guide. There are many more service recommendations from 1000 miles to 25,000 miles. And the factory warranty was one year or 12,000 miles.

For my 2015 Camaro, these are the recommendations:

- --Oil change every 7500 miles, lubricate chassis not needed,
- --Change spark plugs 97,500 miles and replace the air cleaner every 45,000 miles.

--Warranty 'Bumper to Bumper' coverage 3 years or 36,000 miles, power train 5 years or 100,000 miles, rust through coverage is for 6 years or 100,000 miles.

In Michigan, during the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s, rust through could be seen within 2 years with some makes and models of cars.

The gauge for the life of a car back then was not the number of years, but the miles on the car. Every 10,000 miles was 10% of its useful life, so a car with 100,000 miles on was not worth much as trade-in or resale. At 100,000 miles a car was considered worn-out.

Back in 1962, I bought a 1955 Chevy for \$295 with a lot of miles and rust holes in the front fenders over the headlights and the rear quarter panels. This car was only 7 years old and was a throw-away car. Nowadays, it is hard to find a 7 year old car or truck with under 100,000 miles on it for under \$10,000.

Another difference between now and then-- Not many newer cars and trucks leak oil any more, but back a few years ago on paved roads I remember seeing a black stain on the pavement between the tire tracks. This stain was from leaking oil and other fluids dripping onto the road from cars and trucks of the day. That's no longer the norm. The center of the lane is clear of stains. The only place you see the dark stain now is just after a bump in the road or if some car broke something and lost its fluids. They're usually at the side of the road where the driver steered the vehicle.

For the people that read and enjoy my column, I'm sorry that I have been absent from these pages for so long. My health ain't been the best for some time, but I'm doing better now. It has been hard getting my head in a place that I can write again. Thanks to all who have asked.

If punishment does not work, what does? Catch them doing something right

As I promised in my article from last month "You cannot punish a child into good behavior" here is my follow up-REWARDING APPROXIMATIONS OF SUCCESS and CATCH THEM DOING SOMETHING RIGHT

Before I reveal more about these two techniques it might be good to first tell you the reasons most parents do not use them.

First, when we approach our jobs as parents like we are teachers or trainers we naturally tend to gravitate toward "correcting" them. We fall into a habit of waiting until they do something incorrectly then step in and show them the right way. Isn't this what teaching is all about?

Second, just correcting is easier. You only have to watch for those few times they make a mistake and quickly give them feedback.

Rewarding Approximation of Success and Catching Them Doing Something Right will take hard work, patience and consistency. Two "Approximation of Success" stories...

Do you remember when your first child took her/his first steps? She first tried to stand up and fell but you just kept encouraging her to try again. Finally after many attempts she takes her first two steps then tumbles to the ground. You run up with tears in your eyes, hugging and kissing your child. So proud of her trying and succeeding! What if instead when she stumbled after her first step you said "Oh no! What is wrong with you! Get up! All the other kids can walk?!"

Do you know how they train dolphins to do those spectacular jumps over a rope 20 feet in the air? Initially the trainer places a rope at the bottom of the tank, after they give the command and the dolphin goes over the rope they get a treat. Then slowly, over weeks, they raise the rope until it is out of the water. But what if instead the trainer started with the rope 20 feet out of the water and punished the dolphin when it did not jump?

In both cases, would the baby try to walk again or the dolphin even want to get near that rope? Yet this is what we often do once a child is older. We suddenly expect so much so fast. Particularly at the beginning of something new we forget to reward incremental improvements along the path of learnng. You will instill a "growth mindset" by learning to re

approximations of success by praising and rewarding effort, choices and the process a child uses instead of simply the end result. This will develop their desire to learn and motivation to always give it their best.

Catching them doing something right goes right along the same lines. Do you remember from last month's article what always breaks my heart to hear from a struggling child? "Sensei, everybody is always

It seems to them like they can't do anything right? It might make more sense if I relate this to you at work. Let's say you have a great day and do nine things really well and your boss lets you know he is happy. But you have one simple task near the end of the day that you mess up on and the boss is mad. Even though you did those nine good things what is the only thing you remember? It takes 20, 30 or 40 good things to erase the bad thing. It is the same for your child.

A child may do something well 9 out of 10 times. Or, do something correctly 90% of the time but what do we spend most of our time focusing or criticizing them about? The one time or the 10%. So try this instead. Go out of your way to recognize and catch the nine times or the 90%. Watch for them doing something right and I bet that 90% goes up!




