in the Pacific was some of the most tedious and horrifying of World War II. The Allied forces practiced a strategy known as "island hopping." Since the imperial Japanese forces were spread out across many small islands, the Allies were forced to carefully and strategically move their troops and assets from island to island as they conquered each one along the way. This was no small task. The Japanese forces were very embedded and put up an uncompromising resistance to the Americans' advance.

Second, the American forces in the Pacific were willing to endure hardship. The combat for these islands was brutal. Surrender meant a fate worse than death as they would almost assuredly be viciously tortured and then killed anyway, but the continuous fighting was an ultimate test on their physical, mental, and emotional capacities. Real life horrors both from the fighting and from the rough environments of the islands were constantly around the American troops. But somehow, they endured. They accepted the seemingly insurmountable challenges and completed the duty set before them.

So, why did they do all of this? The pain and extreme struggles suffered by the American military in the Pacific were catastrophic, so what caused them to endure such tragedies? I'm sure that there were different specific motivators for each person there, but I think there was one overarching reason. The third trait that they possessed was a vision of the future. They knew that they had a reason to fight. They were protecting their families and country, and they were securing peace for the rest of the world. They kept that purpose in front of them to remember that there was indeed a cause for which they were fighting. No matter our challenges in life, whether dealing with stress in the work place or fighting for our country, we need to have determination, resiliency, and above all, vision.



How often do you hear your child say these words?

technology. But this doesn't excuse us from our obligations as citizens. That's where programs like OK2SAY come in to help us keep our communities safe.

OK2SAY is a state-wide, confidential reporting system for anyone who has information about a student safety threat. The program focuses on early intervention and prevention of violence and is meant to eliminate the barriers to voicing concerns that plague so many school environments. Anyone can submit a tip by text message, phone, through the website, through the mobile app or by email.

OK2SAY has specially trained technicians who review the tips and filter the information out to the appropriate agency to respond in a timely and effective manner. The program also offers free safety seminars for students and adults to help members of the school community understand what to look for and how and when to submit a tip.

In the four years that the program has been active, it has had promising success. OK2SAY not only preempts acts of violence, but it also lets the school community deal with other problems like helping those with suicidal thoughts or combating drugs, sexual misconduct, gang issues and bullying.

Freedom is the most precious thing that Americans have, but with freedom comes responsibility. Ask yourself if you are doing your part to keep America a safe and prosperous place to live, and please look at the OK2SAY program if you have children in school or if you know someone who does.

As a reminder, deadlines are approaching to appeal your property tax assessment. Fowlerville Business Association learns about proposed electric power plant

Members of the Fowlerville Business Association learned more about the proposed gas-fired electric plant in Handy Township during its regular monthly meeting last Tuesday. John Hafner, the project developer for Competitive Power Ventures (CPV), gave a presentation that explained what's being proposed at the local site, how the plant would operate if it is built, what would occur during the construction phase, and what steps the company needs to complete during the current due diligence phase. He also gave a brief history of the company.

Hafner said that the company is "strong on community outreach" and wants to keep residents and other stakeholders informed on what is being proposed and how the project is progressing. As part of that outreach effort, he gave a similar presentation to the Fowlerville Rotary Club at their meeting the following day.

At the FBA meeting, the audience also heard comments from Handy Township Supervisor Ed Alverson about the proposed project and what the Township Board and officials have done to deal with it.

CPV has taken an optionto-purchase on 125 acres in the southeast corner of Handy Township that are owned by two local families. The site was chosen because it is close to natural gas supplies and has easy access to high-power electric lines, two factors that would keep construction costs lower.

One of the sources of natural gas would come from the Vector pipeline that runs in a southwest to northeast direction through the area. The second source is the Rover pipeline that was brought up recently from the south. As planned, at the spot where the two lines intersect, a valve station is being constructed that connects them. This valve station is located next to the 125 acres.

In addition, an ITC electric transmission line, which runs in a north-south direction, borders the property on the east side.

The land is located next to the Fowlerville Proving Grounds, which is zoned

Research & Development, but the rest of the adjacent area is agricultural and residential. A number of those neighboring residents attended recent Handy Township Planning Commission meetings to voice their opposition to the project. Other residents, though, expressed their support.

Hafner began with a brief history of the company, noting that it was formed in 1999 and currently has around 80 employees working primarily at offices near Boston and Washington, D.C., with a small office in San Francisco.

"We have six plants that have come on line or will soon be in operation during the past six years," said Hafner. "These include two sister plants in New Jersey and Maryland that are in operation, one in Connecticut and another in New York that will both be in operation by the end of the year, a plant in Pennsylvania that's about two years from completion, and another gas project in operation in California."

Hafner, in an earlier interview, had said that the company is at the start of a two-year due diligence phase that includes having the land rezoned to Research & Development by the Handy Township Board, gaining information and obtaining necessary permits from county, state, and federal agencies (including the Michigan Dept. of Environmental Quality and

the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency), and looking at the financials.

He had also said that construction takes about two-and-ahalf years. "If the project goes forward, the earliest we'd start construction would be in 2020," he said. "So the earliest the plant would be in operation is late 2022 or early 2023."

Hafner told the FBA members that the company is proposing to build a combined cycle facility that is air cooled. He then explained that there are two types of gas-fired electric plants—a single cycle and a combined cycle. Both types mix and ignite compressed air and high temperature natural gas in the gas turbine to create exhaust heat." The exhaust heat, in turn, spins the turbine blades which rotates a generator that produces electricity.

With a single cycle plant, the excess exhaust heat is lost," he said. "What we do with a combined cycle facility is capture the exhaust heat released by the gas turbine, in a heat recovery steam generator, to create steam which is then routed to a steam turbine to generate additional electricity."

He noted that approximately two-thirds of the energy output is created by the gas-fire heat and another one-third by the steam. "With this combination, we're able to produce more energy for the same amount of gas and have a cleaner operating plant," Hafner said.

The excess steam exiting the steam turbine needs to be condensed. There are two options—a water-cooled system which involves using cold water to do the job and an aircooled system that uses air to do the iob.

'We still use water to create the steam, along with other plant processes, but the average amount needed would be 400,000 gallons a day compared to a water-cooled system that needs three-to-five million gallons."

Hafner also noted that natural gas, using this technology, provides more energy. "Our proposed gas-fired plant has an efficiency rate of approximately 60 percent as compared to coal plants that are at 20 to 30 percent," he pointed out.

Depending on what happens, the plant will either be built to produce 600 megawatts which would provided electricity for 600,000 homes and require an investment of \$700 million or enlarged to 1,200 megawatts which would service 1.2 million homes with an investment of \$1 billion.

Hafner said that the actual plant would have a footprint of 20 to 30 acres and be located in the northwest area of the property. That would be a half-mile north of Mason Road, where the entrance drive is expected to be located, and a third of a mile west of Truhn Road.

The economic benefits he listed, in addition to that huge capital investment, would include using 300 to 500 employees at different stages of the construction over the two-and-ahalf-year period, hiring 25 fulltime employees with an annual payroll of over \$3 million, creating 75 indirect jobs through outside third-party services, becoming the largest taxpayer in Livingston County, and enhancing economic development in the region by offering a closer proximity to electric power.

A couple of points that Hafner brought up were that the company has committed to contracting union workers from Michigan during the construction and that, once operative, the plant would have staff on site around the clock.

Questions were raised by the audience on water usage, air emissions, and noise.

Hafner pointed out that the company has to meet standards set by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Regarding water use, Hafner offered comparisons between other high-volume users in the area and the 400,000 gallons a day the plant would need. One of them is the MHOG (Marion, Howell, Oceola, and Genoa) Sewer & Water Authority that services the four townships in the greater Howell area. The MHOG wells that are located in this area of the county are rated at four to five million gallons a day, meaning they can withdraw that much water

"A center pivot irrigation system uses around 300,000 gallons a day when it's in operation on a farm field, and all of the golf courses in the county, combined, can use over a million gallons a day," he said.

As to concerns expressed by area residents that this usage might adversely impact them by lowering the water table, it was stated that the well would be drilled much deeper into the aguifer than is the case with residential homes.

He said that there is little discernable noise outside the fences, so that would not be a problem.

Regarding air quality, Hafner said that the plant will have one or two stacks used to disperse emissions (depending on whether the plant produces 600 or 1.200 megawatts) and that a stack is normally 160 to 250 feet high, depending on final air modeling.

He explained that extensive modeling and testing is done so that emissions coming from the stack are below the standards set by the EPA to maintain air-quality. The impact of the emissions on soil and vegetation is also modeled to ensure safe conditions.

On the question about noise, he said that this would not be a problem. "Noise is barely discernable if you're standing outside the perimeter fence," Hafner added.

In respond to another question, Hafner said that power plants in Michigan have in the past been built and operated primarily by DTE Energy and Consumers Energy. A number of plants, though, are coming off line or will be shut down in the coming years, he pointed out.

"There will be a lot of power replacement needed in the future with coal and nuclear plants shutting down in the state," he said. "As a private company, we see this as an opportunity to compete. That's what brought us into Michigan. We can sell electric power to public utilities, municipalities, co-ops, and other large-volume energy providers."

Hafner said that he looked at over a dozen sites for a plant, adding "We feel we've found the right one for us in Handy Township."

He also told the audience that oil or natural gas will not be stored on the site. "All the gas will be tapped off the nearby line and can immediately be shut off by a valve if there's a problem," he added.

Handy supervisor Ed Alverson, during the question-andanswer portion, provided background on how the Township has responded to this proposed economic development.

"When I was initially told a big project might be coming to this area, I figured it was a large production plant," he said. "When I learned about the electric plant, my first thoughts were water, air quality and the effect on the environment."

Having never dealt with this type of development project and having nothing in the zoning ordinance dealing with power plants, the board gave me permission to hire a law firm with this kind of expertise to assist us," he said.

Alverson pointed out that if the Township Board chose to "just say no," it would be in violation of Michigan law.

"Our legal counsel told us if we did that, 'open up your check book'," he noted. "Any legitimate business, except for medical marijuana dispensaries, has the right to locate in the Township. If we don't make provisions in the Master Plan and have an area zoned for this use, the business can go to circuit court and the judge will make the decisions for us.

"I don't know what Competitive Power Ventures will decide, but given the proximity of the two gas lines and the electrical transmission line, someone's going to eventually build a power plant in this area," he said. "To give you an idea, five days after we were contacted by this company, a second company called."

Alverson said one step the Township has taken is to draft a proposed amendment to its zoning ordinance that would make a gas-fired power plant a special use in a RD district and spell out requirements that have to be met to obtain siteplan approval.

At a recent meeting, the township planning commission approved changing the Master Plan to include the site in the RD District. The members also recommended the ordinance amendment be adopted along with a request by the property owners and CPV to rezone the 125 acres from Agriculture Residential to Research & Development.

Those two measures have been forwarded to the Livingston County Planning Commission for its review and recommendations. The meeting to consider those will be held March 21 at 6:30 p.m. at the Livingston County Administration Building, 304 E. Grand River, Howell.

The two proposals will then be taken up by the Handy Township Board, which makes the final decision on April 10 at 7 p.m. Anticipating a larger crowd than can be accommodated in the Township boardroom, this meeting will be held at the Fowlerville Junior High.



The Equipping Power of God's Word

Pay attention and turn your ear to the sayings of the wise; apply your heart to what I teach, for it is pleasing when you keep them in your heart and have all of them ready on your lips. So that your trust may be in the Lord, I teach you today, even you. Free Vision Screening for Children to be offered at Webberville Easter Egg Hunt

A Free Vision Screening for Children is being offered during the Webberville Easter Egg Hunt on Saturday, March 31, starting at 10a.m. at the Webberville High School football field. The screening is sponsored by the Webberville Lions Club and is part of the group's Project KIDsight.

The screening is primarily intended for children ages one to six, but older children are welcome.

Project KIDsight is a vision screening program to detect potential vision disorders in children that can cause permanent vision loss when treatment is delayed. Through Project KIDsight, your child's vision will be tested with a high tech camera that will quickly (1 second) and accurately determine whether your child's vision is a Pass or a Refer. When the result of the vision screening is a Refer, the child should be examined by an ophthalmologist or optometrist as soon as possible.

Five percent of all preschool age children experience vision loss from an undetected vision disorder, and treatment options increase when vision problems are detected early in a child's life. Normal vision can usually be restored with eye glasses, contact lenses and sometimes patching.



Last year, we passed an opioid reform package which requires all prescribers to consult a computer database to ensure the patient is not a known drug abuser. While I stand by this legislation, it has inadvertently created a roadblock for hospice care professionals who need immediate access to pain relief for patients receiving end-of-life care. These people are not shopping for drugs, they are in serious pain and should be given the proper care during their transition in the final days of their lives. I appreciate Amy Francoeur, with Hospice of Lenawee, who came to Lansing to deliver testimony about this bill.

The committee will vote on the measure in the coming weeks.

to nine classes in Voyager, Northwest, and Challenger Elementary Schools in Howell. I enjoy talking with the students about the importance of being a good reader and the vital role that it will play throughout their lives no matter what profession they choose. 
