Memorial Day

As Memorial Day approaches, it is important to take a moment to remember the true meaning and history of this special holiday. While many observe this day as the unofficial start to the summer with picnics and barbeques, the true purpose of this day is to honor and remember the legacy of the millions of men and women who sacrificed their lives in defense of our freedoms throughout our history.

Whereas other military holidays such as Veterans Day and Armed Forces Day honor the living and those who have served, Memorial Day is a special recognition to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice while serving in the military.

Did you know that Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day? On May 5, 1868, Gen. John A. Logan, a general in the Union Army during the Civil War, was the first to call for a nationwide day of remembrance to honor those who had fallen during the conflict. The first Decoration Day took place on May 30, 1868 with Gen. James Garfield, later President Garfield, giving a speech at Arlington National Cemetery where volunteers then decorated the graves of the Union and Confederate soldiers.

While originally an informal celebration, the tradition of decorating soldiers' graves on May 30 continued to gain popularity nationwide with most states declaring the day a state holiday by 1890. For decades this practice would continue to be celebrated on May 30 until 1968 when Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as an official federal holiday to be celebrated on the last Monday in May.

Memorial Day will be celebrated on May 29 and there are several ways you can show support during this time of remembrance. You can attend a local ceremony or parade, fly a flag at home or at work from sunrise to noon, thank your local veterans in passing, or celebrate in the traditional sense by decorating the graves of fallen soldiers at your local cemetery. This year, let us remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice to secure our freedom and defend our nation






Tropical Smoothie Café treats FHS students & staff to free drinks

School's new 'Buddy Bench' dedicated in memory of Cali Maifert-Smith

A new 'Buddy Bench' at Smith Elementary was dedicated in memory of Cali-Maifert-Smith, a student who passed away last October. Attending the ceremony on Wednesday morning were Cali's mother, father, sister, grandparents, and a great-grandmother, along with her classmates (now in the first grade).

Emceeing the event which he called "a celebration of Cali's life" was school counselor Pete Wedesky.

"We're here to remember a very special buddy of ours," Wedesky told the students. "Like you, she would have been a first grader this year."

Cali was set to become a member of the 2015-16 kindergarten class when she was diagnosed with a form of leukemia. She was able to attend a few months of classes, starting that fall, but the disease took a turn for the worse and she was admitted to Mott Hospital in Ann Arbor on Feb. 1, 2016.

After several months of grueling treatment and despite what appeared to be a promise of recovery, the young girl passed away on Oct. 25, 2016 from post-transplant complications.

The bench, which has a special plague attached to it commemorating Cali, was covered with a blanket at At Smith Elementary School's new 'Buddy Bench,' dedicated in memory of Cali Maifert-Smith, were members of her family. the start of the event. Chosen to unveil it were first grader Logan Sweet, a young boy who (like Cali) was diagnosed with a form of leukemia. He has been undergoing treatment and his cancer is in remission. Joining him for the task of unveiling the bench was classmate Riley Wetzel.

Members of Cali's family had been given balloons to release after the bench was unveiled. Wedesky noted that they were colored pink and purple, explaining that "these were Cali's favorite colors."

Wedesky then explained to the students the purpose of the 'buddy bench.'

"If you are on the playground and don't have anyone to play with, go sit on the bench," he said. "We have 'buddy watcher's who will see that you have someone to play with. Or if you see someone on the bench, go and offer to play with them. Cali was the kind of kid who would do that. She enjoyed playing with others."

Smith Elementary had held a special fundraiser in March on behalf of the Leukemia/Lymphoma Society's 'Pennies for Patients' Program. That organization was selected specifically due to the two students—Cali and Logan—having each been diagnosed with a blood disease.

Linda Kozianowski, the fundraising campaign specialist for the Society, which is headquartered in Madison Heights, near Detroit, was present for last week's dedication. She noted that the school had done an outstanding job and raised a good deal of money for the Society.

The bench and the commemorative plaque honoring Cali were donated to the school.

One of Cali's grandmothers, Laura Smith, thanked everyone. "This is beautiful and is a great way to keep Cali's memory alive," she said.



Michigan House Report

The Michigan Assisted Claims Plan (MACP) was created in 1973 to provide financial assistance to people injured in an uninsured motor vehicle accident, who have no insurance coverage of their own. Any person (Michigan resident or not) who is injured in an auto accident in Michigan and who has no insurance to pay the resulting medical expenses is eligible to file a claim with the MACP. Additionally, if an individual dies under these circumstances, a survivor may also apply to the MACP for benefits. MACP costs are distributed among the auto insurers and self-insurers in the state.

I gave testimony before the House Insurance Committee on a bill I sponsored to clarifies what a person must do to seek benefits through the MACP. People claiming benefits through the MACP should at least be required to do as much as those claiming benefits from a private insurer, especially since the insurers (and ultimately their customers) pay for MACP benefits. Requiring claimants to cooperate and submit satisfactory proof of loss will enable the Michigan Auto Insurance Placement to accurately determine whether a claim is eligible for benefits.

House Bill 4624 was approved by the committee and now moves to the House floor for further consideration.

It was great to have the opportunity to tour the Providence Park Hospital in Novi to meet physicians and medical staff to learn about state-of-the-art radiology techniques and procedures. I enjoyed seeing new and impressive technology that is less invasive for patients. Thank you to all of the hospital officials who made this

tour possible.

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. Making disciples for Jesus is not the easiest assignment I have ever been given. As a matter of fact, sharing the gospel about the good news of salvation and how easy it is to obtain has been the toughest assignment I have ever faced in life.

One of the reasons, it is so hard is that in our post-Christian society people do not want to hear the uncompromised truth of the gospel. Mainly because following Christ will cost them everything they have held as valuable in their worldly way of thinking.

Follow after Christ and living as he instructs us, by being obedient to his teachings, requires that we become obedient servants and totally surrender to the will of the Holy Spirit. Cremation has taken place through Herrmann Funeral Home. A memorial luncheon will be held at the Fowlerville VFW at a later date.


